BOARD ACTION

President Rob Robinson called the board meeting to order on October 7, 2016 at 6:05 pm at

the Pioneer Center in Oregon City. Ten board members and 16 committee members were present.

Kathryn Damon-Dawson made a motion to accept the past minutes as corrected. Linda Nye seconded. Motion passed. The \$10 increase in dues for both Active and Subscriber members was done via an email vote of the Board on July 14, 2016.

One of the ways WSO has saved money this year is by having members transport the Traveling Show instead of using UPS. Anji Grainger made a motion to reimburse members at the current

federal IRS Mileage rate when transporting the Traveling Show between galleries. Jenny Armitage seconded and the motion passed.

Jayne Ferlitsch moved to change the Convention Refund Policy to state that refunds are made only if a reservation is cancelled within 10 days after the closing date of online registration or in the event of serious illness, accident, or death in the family. After consideration, it was decided 10 days was still too long so the Board amended the motion changing the policy to state: "Refunds are made only if a reservation is cancelled within 5 days after the closing date of online registration." Anji Grainger seconded. Motion passed. This change was made in order to assist Convention Chairs

in securing stable numbers for planning purposes.

The proposed budget presented by Treasurer Peg Patterson was approved. Her goal is to balance income with expenses. As of today, we are looking at a \$5000 deficit. The Finance Council will present a proposal to increase income and decrease expenses at the January board meeting.

Meeting was adjourned at 8 pm.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED TO CONVERT SLIDES OF PAINTINGS TO DIGITAL IMAGES

WSO has a rich history of exhibiting the finest artwork. Beginning in 1985 the exhibi-

tions have been documented with slides. But in this hi-tech age, updating is in order. Tupper Malone is heading a special project to convert the slides to digital images and rename the images with the artist and painting names.

Because this assignment is too great for just one person to accomplish, we are asking for volunteers to assist with the slide conversion. The work may be done in the volunteer's home on their own schedule; although we would like them to accomplish their part of converting one year's slides within a two-week time period. It takes about 3-4 hours to convert and rename the 160 slides for one year to digital images. In the process, the volunteer will get to view some amazing watercolor paintings from past exhibitions.

If you would like to help with this project you will need to have a

working computer knowledge of creating folders, transferring files, renaming .jpg files, and copying files to a CD, DVD, or thumb drive. Assistance in accomplishing these tasks will be provided as needed. There are nearly 2000 slides for 21 years of 1985 to 2006. In 2006 artists began providing digital images. Volunteers will coordinate their work with Tupper Malone who lives in the Portland Metro area. It would be helpful if volunteers lived in the Portland Metro area; however, if you are interested in helping but live outside Portland Metro, we still value your assistance.

ASSURING WSO'S FINANCIAL FUTURE

WSO's annual Profit & Loss statements for the past 8 years show an average <u>loss</u> of \$4,688 per year! This trend must not continue if WSO is to survive financially.

The WSO Board approved the Budget & Finance Committee's recommendation to reduce the 2016 budget deficit of \$16,000 by increasing 2017 dues and reducing shipping expenses for the Traveling Show. The Board also approved the proposed 2017 Budget on October 7, 2016 with a \$5,200 deficit.

As Treasurer, it is my goal to help WSO become fiscally healthy by achieving a balanced budget. The dues increase for 2017 will help but will not get us out of the red. The bottom line (no surprise) is that either we cut additional costs or find ways to increase our annual income.

Convention income and expenses are not part of the general annual budget for WSO. Each convention has its own budget and each Convention Chair is responsible for ensuring that projected income will cover projected expenses. The Board concurred that it doesn't want to burden Convention Chairs with making a profit. Convention profit, if any, does add income to the annual income for WSO. Despite convention profits over the last 8 years, annual deficits have prevailed.

WE NEED YOUR IDEAS!

The Budget & Finance Committee is looking for member input on ways we can increase income and/or decrease expenses. Please email your ideas and possible ways to implement them to me no later than December 30, 2016.

The Budget & Finance Committee will be meeting in early January to discuss all ideas. Thank you for participating!

We are very fortunate and proud that the WSO100Club continues to be the backbone of our Show Awards. Since its establishment in 1984, our Endowment Fund has allowed WSO to honor its prizewinners with something more than a ribbon. For well over 30 years the Endowment Fund has been expertly managed by Jim Williams, Chris Keylock Williams' husband. When Jim became ill and Mickey Beutick-Warren was sitting as WSO100Club President, Albert Beutick assumed responsibility for the WSO100Club Endowment Fund. Under Albert's management the Endowment Fund continued to grow, safeguarding Education and Award monies for a long time to come. We all owe Jim and

Albert gratitude for their diligence and expertise. I also would like to thank Mickey for her valuable contributions and dedicated service for over four years as WSO100Club President. Aloha.

At the 2016 Fall Convention in Oregon City the WSO100Club contributed, for the fourth time, an impressive \$2,500 toward the awards' total. So where does this cash come from, you may ask? The WSO100Club Endowment Fund consists of two distinctly different funds: the Education Fund and the Awards Fund.

The money in the Education Fund is provided by WSO and a few other sources. The WSO Education Chair can request and receive \$2000 per year from this fund to be given to Member Critique Groups to assist in costs for workshops, seminars, etc. Any additional withdrawals require approval of the WSO Board.

It is \$100 donations from fellow WSO artists and many other benefactors that provide the money for the Awards Fund. This fund is self-propelling; only the generated interest is used for awards, leaving the principal intact at all times.

When you contribute \$100, you become a WSO100Club Patron for life. Your name will be listed in each of the WSO Award Catalogues. If you are already a 100Club member, you can consider donating again. You may contribute in the name of a grand-child, an influential art teacher, or perhaps a favorite artist. Andrew Wyeth or Pablo Picasso can be listed on the same page along with your name. 
Winning Awards with Strong Paintings & Values with Harold Walkup

Historic Homes Walking Tour

Local resident Denyse McGriff has an undergraduate degree in history and a passion for historical preservation. Fascinated tour participants eagerly followed Denyse on an easy walk around the McLoughlin Historic District photographing Queen Anne and Colonial homes as well as Arts & Crafts bungalows, to name a few. All the while we learned the stories of current, past, and original homeowners from our guide. The buildings we viewed dated between 1845 and 1925, and most were true to their original design. We only saw a fraction of the homes in the district, let alone the rest of Oregon City-the oldest incorporated city west of Missouri. (Astoria was a privately owned town and incorporated later). If you are a history buff or admire architecture with style, this is the town for you!

Painting Historic Homes with Jenny Armitage

After the Oregon City Historic Homes Walking Tour on Friday afternoon, Jenny Armitage showed us how to obtain strong values, colors, and a sense of light when painting houses or other architectural elements and city-scapes. She shared her methods for creating a thoughtful composition and building a painting using successive masking and color pouring techniques, followed by final brushwork.

Jenny demonstrated painting in successive layers by mixing and pouring color washes over areas of the composition, tilting the paper and letting color flow while protecting selected areas with masking fluid. Fun and easy method! You have all the usual uncontrolled circumstances as the colors flow around and plenty of creative license. So why pour? "It forces you to plan your painting so that you get bold shapes and colors, and very distinct values," says Jenny. Jenny is an excellent instructor; she not only showed us how to mask and pour, but also how to plan a painting starting with your reference photo and

using digital methods to analyze values and make design choices. An inspiring and informative session!

Working in Series: Why and How with Margaret Godfrey and Kathy Tiger



By Geoff McCormack Margaret Godfrey and Kathy Tiger's Working in Series: Why and How was a conversation between the two

artists. They began with quotes from several painters on their idea of what a series is. Ruth Armitage contributed my favorite: "To me, working in a series means tackling an idea that has enough depth that I can explore the possibilities in many paintings. Each painting is related by the over-reaching subject, but the individual works express different facets."

Margaret and Kathy loosely defined working in a series to be a personal set of parameters that give direction and focus for creating a coherent body of work. Then they projected images of their own series as examples of sources of inspiration and the parameters that guided them in their choices of subject, concept, material, and technique until the completion of the work.

Margaret's life spent out-ofdoors on the Rogue and McKenzie Rivers was her primary inspiration for creativity. Her Heron Series sprung from rafting the rivers. The *River Series* includes the elements of the rivers: wildlife, landscape, history, and water. Then the Heron Series morphed comfortably into an investigation of the salmon, spawning the *Life Cycle Series*. Margaret's series showed how each piece in a series can develop the communication of a deepening concept because of the work that had been done previously. Working in series brings the ultimate advantage of inspiration springing from the

elderly father and photographing her father pensively viewing the burial ground. When she returned home she walked to a favorite quiet place, the nearby Pioneer Graveyard. Inspired by these experiences Kathy visualized her father's photo combined with the Pioneer Graveyard. What I thought would be a series on graveyards took on greater depth as we viewed her portfolio with Kathy's voiceover. Her story was much more than any one painting could express. The flowers left behind, a carved rose in marble, the native bough of quince draped over a grave marker, told the narrative of loss, love and recovery. Working in series can bring depth to the visual expression of an idea or emotion.

Working in Series by Margaret Godfrey and Kathy Tiger was one of the best breakout sessions I have attended. If they do it again, I recommend that you take it!

Falls, Rivers, and Streams with Suzi Blaisdell and Diane York

Did you know that the Oregon City Bridge is the only Oregon bridge to be encased in gunite, which protects its steel frame from corrosive sulfur dioxide fumes from the paper mills south of the bridge? All but one of the paper mills has closed, but you can still see some of the old buildings surrounded by trees to provide artistic inspiration.

Perspective: A Point of View with Leslie Cheney-Parr

It was a pleasure and a privilege to have Leslie Cheney-Parr talk with us about perspective. Much was learned from Leslie's very well organized handout, white board illustrations, and participant hands-on exercises. She began by presenting the history of perspective in art. This dated clear back to 3200 B.C.

One of the two activities was using a horizon line, vanishing points, and orthogonals (lines radiating from the vanishing point). Leslie demonstrated how to apply this to sketching outdoors i.e. fence posts, trees, and buildings with windows. The second activity was using a wonky tic-tac-toe type grid to aid in drawing a simple object in a more interesting way. This fun exercise resulted in participants creating very interestingly shaped coffee cups, etc. I did not do very well with this new challenge. However, I did get some great exciting ideas for making my pear paintings more interesting!

Thank you, Leslie, for sharing so much interesting information about perspective plus encouraging us to try your activities which made us think of new ways to present our art.

Fine Art Gouache with Art Graham

A happy group of attendees paid close attention as Art Graham explained that gouache is an opaque watercolor that should be applied full-bodied like acrylic or oil paint. He explained the process of making gouache and some of its history.

There are two main types of gouache available: Designer and Artist gouache. Designer gouache is not permanent. M. Graham Artist gouache uses the same permanent, lightfast pigments as in transparent watercolor. We learned that we can increase resolubility of M. Graham gouache by adding a teaspoon of honey to four ounces of water, and using this to thin the gouache. We also learned how to make egg tempera using gouache.

Art Graham explained that watercolorists are starting to use gouache more. If you add an opaque passage along with transparent watercolor, the gouache jumps out visually due to the contrast between the two.

After this informative lecture Art encouraged our many questions. With free samples of paint that he passed around, we left ready to experiment.

Doug Davies' "Working Wet into Wet"

Doug Davies' "Working Wet into Wet" inspired participants to loosen up and be creative with color. For his demonstration Doug chose a boat harbor on a misty morning, suggested by a palette of neutral colors. With a limited pencil sketch he captured the essential structures of the fishing boats. Then he laid on a thin light wash in both warm and cool tones using a large synthetic flat brush. His second wash was heavier as he carefully painted around the saved white areas, letting his pencil marks show through. Throughout the demo Doug continually analyzed the values and gradually built up the darker values, placing less emphasis on color. Then he did some negative painting and lifted some of the darks to suggest the masts of nearby fishing boats. For the finishing touches Doug used a small brush and added a bit of acrylic paint for highlights or dark accents. Like magic these beautiful final touches helped focus the viewer's eye to the most important areas of the painting.

Doug inspired and encouraged us, and reminded us that for every successful painting, he had several more that he wasn't satisfied with but learned wet into wet through experimentation.

Francesco Fontana Workshop Challenged to Complete a Painting in Fewer Strokes

By Anji Grainger What an amazing 2016 Fall Convention Workshop we had with Francesco Fontana! Francesco took us through a



series of exercises designed to teach us how to be more expressive in our work with fewer brush strokes. On the first day of the workshop he asked us to bring an image that we wanted to paint. Then he had us put them on the table; our assignment was to pick someone else's photo and make a painting with it–very interesting experience.

As we worked our way through the week we discussed composition, elements of design, and using less colors. Here's a brief synopsis of the 5-day workshop:

- Day 1-"It's all about value."
- Day 2-We developed dominant, sub-dominant, and accent values in our paintings. We chose an image and then changed something about it, i.e. the orientation, composition, or color.
- Day 3-We discussed complementary colors and adding a

- third color to go with the compliments and then added that to our lesson in value.
- Day 4-We worked with fewer brush strokes and focused on the benefits of simplifying composition and design.
- Day 5-On the last day of the workshop Francesco Fontana challenged us to complete a painting in less than 100-150 brush strokes. The painting shown on the next page was completed in about 140 strokes.

Many, many thanks to Francesco for a wonderful learning experience!

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR THE TRAVELING SHOW

As many of you know the WSO budget has been running a deficit for several years now. Recently the WSO Board has been looking at ways of reducing expenses. One of the biggest costs is shipping the Traveling Show. The last full year that we used commercial shipping it cost WSO \$8300. In an effort to reduce this cost we are asking for volunteers to help in moving the crates between galleries.

If you live near a gallery that is hosting the show, please consider picking it up and taking it to the next venue. Each time this is done it will save WSO \$500-\$800 or more depending on the distance involved. Check the Exhibition Schedule for the Traveling Show in each issue of the *Watermark* to see the list of future galleries.

The host gallery will pack up each show, and all that is necessary for you to do is to help load the crates into your vehicle, which most galleries will help with, and then drive to the next location. The four crates are large, 44-inches high, 45-inches long and 14-inches wide. Your vehicle must be large enough to handle those dimensions. A minivan or larger vehicle will work. Pickup trucks would also be ok since the cases are waterproof.

The WSO Board has voted to reimburse drivers at the IRS Mileage Rate, which currently is 54 cents per mile. If you are interested in helping to transport the Traveling Show, please contact John Mohney. Any help you can give will help bring down WSO expenses.

The show will enjoy an extended stay and exposure at Concordia from August through September before heading to the 2017 Fall Convention in Troutdale.

If you happen to be in the area please stop in and introduce yourself to the hosting galleries. They always appreciate the support and relish the added insight to the Traveling Show that members can provide. The exposure that the Watercolor Society of Oregon and its participating

artists receive through the Traveling Show is invaluable to those involved.

I hope that you all will continue to paint and grow as artists and share your talents with the rest of Oregon by participating in the conventions and traveling shows. *Good luck!*




