SPRING CONVENTION 2013

April 5-7, 2013

Albany, known as the "Hub City" since the turn of the 20th century, is the location of the WSO Spring 2013 Convention. Albany is conveniently located off I-5 in the mid-Willamette Valley, where the Holiday Inn Express and Comfort Suites will be home base for the Spring 2013 Convention. Many activities during the weekend will be held at the Holiday Inn Express, but Comfort Suites is just steps away if you want to relax away from the excitement of the convention without driving anywhere.

Expect this to be a fun convention. The weekend begins on Friday at Holiday Inn Express with a combined Meet & Greet the juror, Mary Ann Beckwith, and the new WSO members. Ms. Beckwith, a teacher at Michigan Technological University for 39 years, is often described by her students as "awesome," "inspiring," "a very free thinker" and "having a good"

sense of humor." Come meet her and see for yourself. Diane Pinney, the New Members Chair, will have a digital slide show with examples of new members' paintings. Scout out what your new competitors for future shows are able to do.

Saturday will be packed with activities. There will be three breakout sessions and the first Juror Critique in the morning. A similar set up with additional sessions and a second Juror Critique will be held in the afternoon. The program has a number of interesting and knowledgeable presenters. Richard Helmick, a noted Corvallis artist, will point out the influences of past Masters in paintings by WSO members. Linda Rothchild-Ollis will present a session in which WSO artists will submit images and then ask session participants how to improve them. Then Linda, with her technical expertise, will help to visualize these improvements using

MARY ANN BECKWITH Spring 2013 Juror and Workshop Instructor

While moving around a lot with her parents during her early years, art was Mary Ann Beckwith's best friend and she was never without some sort of art materials. By high school, she was hooked on art and has been heavily involved ever since, both as a working artist and a teacher. She found that teachers share with one another, then teachers share with their students, and students also bring in what they know. All of this produces a cycle of learning and introducing new ideas.

Mary Ann Beckwith is equally a painter and a teacher, with a passion for both. She has taught watercolor, drawing and design at Michigan Technological University since 1973, helping future engineers/scientists exercise both sides of their brains. She received the university's Distinguished Teaching Award in 1996 and again in 2003 (the maximum number of


applied the next year and was juried into membership. In 2000 I had a painting accepted into a show. And I was hooked by the first convention I attended.

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In Memorium





Gene Gill January 26, 1930 - July 27, 2012

Eugene Gill was born in Wilkes-Barre, PA on January 26, 1930. He was the youngest of six children. His early life was difficult as both his parents died before he was two years old. He was adopted and raised by his aunt. As a young teen, Gene was stricken with rheumatic fever for three consecutive winters. While bed ridden, he did what he would eventually do best - draw and sketch for hours on end.

After graduating from Kingston High School he joined the Air Force during the Korean War. He felt very fortunate to have spent the majority of his military service in Hawaii, where he met his future wife Teddi at a dance. After completing his military service, Gene attended Portland State University for one year before transferring to the prestigious Art Center School in Los Angeles. There he earned his degree in Advertising and Illustration in 1959. The next 10 years would be a whirlwind of jobs for Gene, in Chicago and Detroit, working for well-known advertising agencies. Finally in 1970 Gene and Teddi agreed it was time to settle down in one place: Portland, Oregon.

Through the 1970's, Gene worked as a Creative Director for the advertising agency of McCann-Erickson. After leaving the agency he chose to be his own boss, and worked as a free-lance illustrator and commercial artist - eventually becoming one of Portland's premiere fine arts painters. He was best known for his watercolor series, "Portraits of Portland." Painting Portland scenes and sharing his knowledge with others is what he truly enjoyed most.

Gene Gill was a very active member in WSO from 1993-2010, winning awards in nearly every show he entered. Chris Keylock Williams, who tracks points for

the WSO Merit Award program, was surprised to discover that Gene never formally entered the Merit program - he would have earned 55 points! In 2006 Gene served on WSO's Education Council and suggested the formation of the Regional WSO Critique Groups which many of our members have benefited from.

At the 2012 Spring Convention in Portland, Gene lectured about how he selects and photographs subject matter for his paintings. Unable to lead the group on the walk, Gene sent them out to photograph downtown Portland on their own. It was a most successful morning. Participants saw and photographed several of the locations in his paintings as we walked around.

Gene was an integral member of WSO's Metro critique group (which meets the 2nd Tuesday night of each month at the Village Gallery of Arts.) The group praised Gene in a book containing 5 x 7 paintings, along with comments about how much Gene's critiques have helped them grow as artists. An excerpt from Diana Nadal's statement reads: "you have made me think outside the box, you have trained me not to rely on one photograph when choosing something I want to paint, you have inspired me to simplify my compositions, and finally you've convinced me that it is okay to add whatever media is necessary to complete a painting: like daring to use some gouache!" This book was presented to him just weeks before his death.

Gene and Teddi lived in their Cedar Mill home for over 40 years. It was in this home, that Gene absolutely loved, where he died peacefully in his sleep on July 27th, 2012. He is survived by his wife of over 50 years, Teddi, and their three sons (Eugene, David and Jason,) and two grandsons (Andrew and Jimmy).

WSO/Menucha Workshop Update

Think ahead about what you'd like to learn in 2013. There are two outstanding instructors coming to lead workshops at Menucha.

Robbie Laird



Robbie Laird will bring her expertise on layered watermedia to Menucha June 9-13, 2013. "Flow and Form: The Synergy of Ebb and Flow Painting" is based on Laird's inspiring premise about "Informed Intuitive" painting. Laird says she will help participants "become more spontaneous without being out of control."

Robbie will share unique techniques for controlling large flowing wet-into-wet areas as well as a variety of other water media effects used in her own work. She will share how she extends her personal vision by exploring a subject, then experimenting with layering various media effects such as gouache, watercolor crayons and acrylic mediums. Lavering and combining effects enables her to have more control while remaining spontaneous. She will demonstrate how she uses the strength of design as well as information gathered, to allow the most freedom while painting.

A special bonus in this workshop will be the opportunity to try samples of the new colors from M. Graham Paints as well as some Golden Acrylic mediums for special textural effects. Robbie has been to Golden Paints for special training in the use of their new acrylic products.

Painters will be encouraged to identify and capitalize on their own

painting strengths and may use all water media to create layered effects in their paintings. Realistic painting and abstract painting are equally encouraged. Individual critiques and assistance will be given each day.

Robbie has a reputation for encouraging painters, whatever their level of accomplishment, to break through to new levels of freedom and confidence in painting.

Linda Aman



Linda Aman teaches "Color Study Triads Watercolor Workshop" from November 10-13, 2013. Participants will learn to paint using a limited pallet and mix glowing colors without creating mud.

Day one: Color theory, using multiple choices of triad combinations to understand the power of painting with a limited pallet. Bring harmony to paintings with glowing rich colors. The first painting project will prepare participants for the next two days by giving a deeper understanding of color and composition.

Day two: Begin a painting with one of the triad combinations that inspired you. Learn how to apply clean glazes of color. The painting project will be taught with demonstrations step-by-step, giving personal attention to each artist. Photo references are supplied but participants may bring their own.

Day three: Continue painting with instruction and personal critiques. Learn about "finishing techniques" of paintings. We will review and have additional discussions, such as critiques and composition.



Often he said he was proud of the creations of various WSO artists. Thank you Chris, for your heartfelt critique of our work on Saturday night. We also thank you for the enlightening daytime Juror's Critiques, efficiently run by chair Diane York.

Like a scene from the Pied Piper, on **Sunday morning** our members were led into the Business Meeting to the tune of bagpipes played by Jayne Ferlitsch. Then Chris was back in action for his demo. He used his sketch of a forested area in Western Oregon.

Chris likes to do "speed sketching" to quickly distill the lights, darks and checkerboard patterns of natural scenes. He uses pens because he likes the lines that are "just from him." He encouraged us to paint for ourselves, to express what is in our hearts to communicate our view of the world. He wants us to paint like a nine-year-old and let our paintings

take on a life of their own. Chris uses allegory in some of his paintings. In this demo, the trees of the forest reminded him of a vaulted cathedral with stained glass windows. As he developed his painting, he wanted us to see the rhythm of the cathedral vaults.


His painting came to life as he skillfully used lots of color, wet on wet; lifting out light

He wants us to experience the joys and challenges of taking a risk in painting.

When his painting was finished, he put down his brush, stepped back and said: "I hope you like this painting." He said "I am proud to be here." What an inspiration. We were proud and honored to have Chris as juror.

Presentation by LaVonne Tarbox-Crone

LaVonne Tarbox-Crone enthralled the crowd with her presentation entitled "Don't Take No for an Answer." LaVonne provided several images/examples of how she took a "problem" painting and revamped it. She showed us step-by-step images of paintings that went from good to great. She did this by going further, pushing the values, and honing in on parts of the painting that could be made stronger.

LaVonne's "fix-it" remedies range from dousing a painting in the sink, adding gouache, acrylic or collage, and cropping her painting with a mat.

She described how emphasizing tried and true design principles is the key to catching a juror's eye. Digital images of WSO members' paintings proved her points: "Design trumps everything else," and "a good design works in any direction." She also shared the concept of finishing a painting, going over every inch of it to make sure there are no incomplete places or weak transitions. She feels that finishing is a factor in all prize-winning paintings.

LaVonne gave us all much to think about in our own work and the confidence to keep pushing ourselves and our paintings to the next level of excellence.

Anji Grainger's "Water Droplets in Watercolor" class

Anji Grainger showed students how to look closely at a water droplet and see the way it reflects its surroundings, the shading of colors within it, and the shadow it casts. Water stretches reflections, so they can appear backwards or even upside down. Stretched 140 lb. paper, using the right brush, and preserving the white of the paper are essential for accurate depiction of drops. The three-hour session allowed students to work on drawing, shading, highlighting and combining the preciseness of painting water drops with the looseness of the background.

Dana Hamburg wrote "The contrast of a soft background with the details of

the drop and the images within it help to draw focus to the drop."

This was truly an inspirational class in the observation and depiction of one of nature's most beautiful manifestations.

A crisp fall morning, dewy grass, and two experienced en plein air artists created a memorable experience at the 9am paint-out at the Welches Golf Course. We heard bagpipes far down the greens slowly making their way to the top of the hill, serenading us in the grand Scottish tradition. Susan Spears and Hyon Fielding took a stance at their easels and created two uniquely interpreted paintings of the beauty of the golf course with its surrounding mountains, spectacular fall foliage and serene golf greens.

Both Susan and Hyon are skilled at painting the essence of what they see, not exact duplicates. From start to finish, they both shared the steps they take to ensure a remarkable finished painting. They demonstrated their different approaches with four one-minute scribble sketches, four one-minute color studies, and then simplifying the shapes. They showed us their totally different tree painting techniques, painted in the bagpiper, and ended by matting the finished piece.

This was an educational experience with two excellent instructors in a breathtakingly beautiful, unique northwest setting. Thank you WSO.

First Dyanne demonstrated how to apply light molding paste over the white paper, vertically then horizontally, leaving exposed white paper in places. After this dried, she showed the class how to paint in vertical liquid acrylic stripes. Then black gesso was applied with a flat brush. The pattern with this brush was thin/fat random lines. The final application was done with wax based colorful colored pencils.

Because Dyanne was so well organized many of the attendees were able to accomplish the whole project in a short period of time. Her generosity with all of her knowledge and materials made this an exciting and fun project. Many of us are encouraged to try this again. Thanks for sharing with us, Dyanne.

Lynn Powers on Portraits

Lynn Powers' Powerpoint® presentation was a gift to us. She shared her personal insight into what matters to her as she records the anatomy of her sitter, as well as her quest to stay authentic. Her extensive knowledge of anatomy enhances her understanding of the watercolor techniques needed to display a graduated cheek curve as opposed to a firm nasal ridge line. She gave us a fact-filled presentation on her thoughts and her method.

While she told entertaining stories of the portrait she was working on (of Dante, her mother's Pool Guy), she showed us her progress step-by-step. She spoke of hot darks along the hairline and in the nostrils. In her portraits, she looks for and records color on the planes of the face, neck, and head. She loves the color-play on surfaces and relishes their reflective

and absorptive qualities. She thoroughly understands the value, temperature and shape of any plane on the face in any light, as she so clearly showed us using the visual aids of photography, close-ups and painting samples.

And while we listened to all the

wonderful watercolor advice on technique, her color choices, her working methods, we also learned of her sincere quest to continue to learn and to change as she grows artistically. Lynn is a lively presenter and a generous lecturer. We came away enriched as well as educated. I could do this again very easily!!

CHRIS VAN WINKLE WORKSHOPS

Luckily for us, Chris Van Winkle made his first ever trip to Oregon from Morro Bay, California. He taught a 2day workshop before the convention and a 3-day workshop postconvention. We met in the picturesque setting in Welches at St. John's in the Woods Catholic Church.

Chris had driven up the coast with his wife and son, and he stopped along the way to sketch and form his impression of Oregon to be used in future paintings. The first thing he did in the workshop was to share his unfinished sketchbook of his Oregon journey. He believes that you should paint from your sketchbook and not from a photo which "has no heart."

Chris' warm and witty teaching style is one part sage advice, one part travelogue (Why do the domes on Russian churches have different shapes?) and one part artistic life coach with

such advice as "You don't have many years on this earth so you should paint like you are writing your novel." and "The only thing that really stays behind after man leaves is art."

With that, we prepared to 'write our novels,' trying our hand at line sketches, value sketches, graded washes, nonobjective paintings, outdoor vignettes and abstract

designs. Many fundamentals were reviewed the first day to the appreciation of both seasoned and new painters. Chris emphasized that design is the most important thing in your painting.

We took advantage of the summery October weather by doing some plein air painting, looking for the darks between the trees and using gesture to create emotion. One of the many assignments Chris left us with was to study 12 trees a year. Learn their structure and the things that make them look different from other trees.

Chris is still studying Oregon trees and will be working on his impressions of what he has seen and experienced in Oregon. He said we should look up his paintings of Oregon in a year to see what stories he has to tell.

A final reminder from the long time California teacher: "Remember, we are in the business of creating poems with our paintings."

Challenge yourself to earn Merit Award points! You qualify to enter the program when you have

accumulated ten points. Download a copy of the Merit Award point list from the WSO website or pick up a copy at the next convention. Fill it out with a record of your ten points and send the list to me. I'll keep track of your points from then on.

In the past and through the Fall 2008 Convention in Florence you got a total of five points for a Sweepstakes Award, three points for 1st, 2nd or 3rd, and one point for paintings that got into the show but did not win an award.

Beginning Spring '09, we changed the name of Sweepstakes to "Best of Show" and it still earns 5 points. We have dropped the name of 1st Place. Now we have 2nd through 6th Place followed by Awards of Achievement and Distinction. You will earn a total of four points for a 2nd, 3rd or 4th Place Award, a total of three points for all other award winning paintings, and one point for paintings that got into a show but did not win an award. You will receive recognition at conven-

tions as you reach each level, and a beautiful WSO logo pin at 25 points (Platinum Level, a silver pin) and at 50 points (Diamond Level, a gold pin).

Jim Powers will be telling the story of his and his wife Lynn's great art workshop video company, Creative Catalyst. Presentations by Ruth Armitage, Helen Brown, and Geoff McCormack will round out this very full day of learning.




