



President's Message

I often hear from Members that one obstacle they face when they consider volunteering for a position is how far apart we live from one another. To me, 2020 seems like a good year to start thinking about how to use the technology available to us (much of it at no cost) to connect our Members from all over the state. As we all know, one of the best things about our conventions is the opportunity to see old (and meet new) friends. as of April 2020, the Traveling Show will reach its last station at Astoria. Award winners from the 2019 October Convention in Bend will be able to pick up their paintings at the Liberty Theater lobby on Saturday, April 4.

Watermark Board Action

On January 11, the WSO Board met at the Albany Public Library in Albany, OR. President Barb Sulek called the meeting to order at 12:20 pm. Ten Board members and ten committee members were present.

President Barb Sulek announced that the signing of the Conflict of Interest Statements will be moved to the April meeting when the full Board is present.

Secretary Amanda James' Board minutes from the October 2019 meeting in Bend were approved.

President Barb Sulek announced that Elvina Christopherson has resigned the position of Treasurer. President Barb Sulek appointed Peg Patterson as Acting/Interim Treasurer under the provisions of Article IV, Board of Directors, Section 8, filling vacancies. The Board thanked Peg for her willingness to serve in this capacity while the search for a new Treasurer is undertaken.

President Barb Sulek presented a Motion, which passed unanimously, adding the following language to Policy 11.C.3: "Allow Lifetime Members who move out of Oregon to retain their membership but be reclassified to subscriber status."

Acting/Interim Treasurer Peg Patterson presented the WSO 2020 budget which had been adopted and

approved at the October 4, 2019 Board meeting. There is a net loss of \$5,420. The reported cash balance as of 12/30/19 is \$96,585.69. We also have \$3,231.80 in our PayPal account. These numbers are preliminary. The final Treasurer's report is forthcoming.

Acting/Interim Treasurer Peg Patterson moved that WSO allocate the sum of \$1,000 to purchase a new PC laptop, a new printer/scanner, and an initial WSO owned subscription to Microsoft Office Suite, specifically for use by the Treasurer. The Motion passed unanimously.



Acting/Interim Treasurer Peg Patterson moved that "All checks over \$5,000 drawn on WSO accounts shall have two authorized signatures, OR in lieu of two signatures, the written approval of the President for the expenditure to be paid with one check signer." The Motion passed unanimously.

Vice President Angela Grainger suggested that the juror contract reflect exact dates and number of nights that WSO covers for Juror's stay. This change will be made.

Vice President Angela Grainger asked the Board for any recommendations for Jurors starting in 2023. Awards Director Beth Verheyden introduced a Motion, which passed unanimously, to replace Policy 11.K.5. with the following language: "The People's Choice Award will be selected by attendees at the opening Artists' Reception of each exhibition; winners will have their paintings reproduced on the WSO Roster & Handbook; and the value of the cash award will not exceed the value of any of the 20 juror selected awards."

Exhibition Awards Chair Donna Bekooy reported that solicitation letters for awards will be sent out in January.

Merit Awards Chair Becky Meier reported that recordkeeping for merit award points continues to progress, and most likely new Signature Members will be announced at the April Convention. Their certificates will be created and handed out at the Convention.

Awards Director Beth Verheyden discussed the status of the WSO promotional video, which is now complete and includes changes to the audio. She intends to show the video to attendees of the Meet & Greet, as well as before the Awards Banquet begins, and at the Business Meeting. A Marketing Strategic Planning Committee has been formed as part of the Budget & Finance Committee. The Members include Meg McGill, Susan Pfahl, and Beth Verheyden. The purpose of the committee will be to develop a marketing strategy with a focus on social media, to promote WSO, within WSO to recruit volunteers and as well as (continued on page 5)

outside of WSO to bring in new members.

Convention Director Zsuzsa Vamos thanked her Astoria Co-chairs Becky Meier and Sandra Wood. **Becky Meier** reported on the status of the Convention. Every aspect is progressing smoothly. There are





seventeen Breakout Sessions; the vendors include Merri Artist, American Easel, and Menucha. Becky's cousin (not a WSO member) will be handling the Meet & Greet. The Tri-chairs are working on a timeline to complete tasks during the Convention, more tables have been rented, and a shuttle bus has been arranged.

Vice-President Anji Grainger, who is also Co-chair of the 2020 Fall Convention, reported that arrangements are taking shape very well. She also reminded everyone that this is a very popular time of year in the wine country and encouraged people to make room reservations early.

Convention Registration Chair Leslie Boyce reported the online registration dates. Registration will open on Saturday, February 15 at 8:00 am and close on Saturday, March 7 at 8:00 pm. The deadline for cancellations is Friday, March 13. Materials will be ready to go to the printer approximately March 20, and Hospitality will pick up materials from the printer for convention packet coordination the following week.

Juror Liaison Chris Helton reported that letters, contracts, and forms to notify Members of the juror's selections have been updated. Emphasis has been placed on clarifying the instructions for preparing paintings, especially on how to hand-deliver and pick-up paintings.

Online Entries Chair Mary Elle reported that everything is on track. Only 15 images have been submitted, but there will be many more as the February 1 deadline approaches.

Membership Director Suzi Blaisdell reported that, as of December 24, 2019, there are 646 Active and Lifetime Members with 76 unpaid Members. Subscriber Members total 61 with 39 unpaid Members. She has received 150 checks for renewal payment. These did not include Member Surveys, which are important to WSO. We will discuss this at the next Board Meeting.

New Member Chair Liz Walker reported that we have 64 New Members. Suzi, Barb, and Liz have a classification system so New Members will be welcomed depending on when they join WSO.

Mentor Program Chair Debi Loyd reported that all New Members, and current mentors, as well as those who have shown interest in the program have been contacted.

Advertising Chair Paul Bourgault reported that the online Watermark has been well received.

Watermark Editor Sue Anne Seckora and Publisher Elizabeth Zimmerman announced the production schedule for the digital February 2020 Watermark. The issue will be posted to the WSO website on February 1.

Website Liaison Carol Putnam reported the numerous updates, which have been made to the website, including but not limited to a major overhaul of the tabs and pages, resulting in an increase in the number of tabs and a significant decrease in the total number of pages.

New Publication Director and Communication Chair Elizabeth Zimmerman provided a summary of the 21 email campaigns which were sent out between September 11 and December 29, 2019.

Administrative Director Diane York mentioned that some job descriptions are still needed. She reminded the Board that although Logo Merchandise is not a money-making venture for WSO, it is important for our Members and helps to promote WSO.

DVD Librarian Pat Farr reported that 68 DVDs have been loaned out. She also (continued on page 6)

asked the Board for any suggestions for additions to our collection.

Education Director Margaret Godfrey reminded the Members that requests for grant money will start after January 1 and will be handled on a first come, first served basis. Margaret Godfrey would like the Board to determine what legal issues would be associated with moving the Education Director to the 100 Club (a 501(c)3) to help support the educational part of the mission of WSO. She would like to see a committee established to write grants and to determine how the funds would best be utilized.

WFWS Delegate Margaret Godfrey reported that 113 images by WSO artists were forwarded to the Idaho Watercolor Society. Juror Stephen Quiller will forward his selections to the Idaho Watercolor Society by February 24, 2020. This year will be Margaret Godfrey's last year as a delegate and a new delegate and alternate have been selected. Though the role included a great deal of work, Margaret thanked the Board for the honor.

Menucha Representative Chris Stubbs reported that Steve Kleier will teach in the spring of 2020 and Margaret Godfrey will teach in the fall of 2020. She also mentioned that additional teachers are needed.

Past President Chris Stubbs announced open positions which include Treasurer and additional assistance for Logo Merchandise sales and Registration.

Past President Chris Stubbs announced that the restated bylaws are finished but will not be included in the roster. However, copies will be available upon request. The updated policies will be included in the roster.

President Barb Sulek spoke of the immense contributions that Rob Robinson has made to WSO. She suggested that WSO appoint someone that Rob would train to be familiar with the technology he has instituted for WSO. This individual would eventually serve as Technology Director and could be from within or outside WSO. President Barb Sulek indicated that the "Book of Rob" is being created so that the information Rob has amassed and the structure he has developed for WSO can be accessed.

In addition, **President Barb Sulek** distributed thumb drives to all present so that important emails and documents could be saved and transferred more efficiently to successors.

Introducing New Members for 2019/2020



In the 2019 November *Watermark*, I reported that 21 New WSO Active Members had joined WSO as of October 1. Since then we have added 55 more for a total of 76 New Active Members! This recent spike in membership is due to our new membership policy. Applicants are no longer required to submit 3 images to be juried in for active membership. This means that New Members (as long as they reside in the state of Oregon and pay their active membership dues) can join anytime and immediately take advantage of our Active Member benefits, including submitting images to our fall and spring juried exhibits.

After consulting with the WSO President and the Membership Director, we agreed to reclassify all of these New Members as "Class of 2020" (even if they joined in 2019) in order to synchronize with membership dues (due by November 1 of each year). 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Retired nurse Chris Stubbs focused on understanding the bone structure, facial muscles, skin color, and shadow patterns to create a realistic glowing portrait; while color and design artist Rene Eisenbart emphasized interesting backgrounds, which support the mood you want to express in your unique portrait.

Both instructors asked us to think deeply about why we were drawn to the subject we chose to paint and what story we wanted to tell. They discussed the importance of completing many different studies of our subject, emphasizing dramatic light and shadow patterns, and applying good design principles to the composition.

It was a wonderful opportunity for us to try different styles, explore techniques, make mistakes, and learn. What a treat it was to be able to focus on one topic and paint for four straight days. Thanks Chris, Rene, and WSO.

Michael Reardon Workshop

The workshop with Michael will be your time to learn how to move forward and bring more of yourself, your feelings, your ideas, and your memories into your work. He will be there to teach, help, and guide you. You will have private time to discuss your progress, receive advice, and share your work with others.

What Michael says about the workshop:

"The main goal of my workshops is that students take their work to another level. I have found that focused attention on each student yields the best results. I have also developed techniques to teach the material clearly.

I begin each workshop day with a demonstration that relates to that day's theme. Each day emphasizes some aspect of painting, such as values, light, and composition. I place a strong emphasis on composition and have developed guidelines to help everyone improve their sense of design.

After the demonstration, participants do value studies and paint while I consult individually with everyone. Unlike in many workshops students work from their own photos. I do this partly because people are more engaged with their own photos, rather than use the instructor's materials (although people are welcome to work from my photo and demonstration of the day). It also provides direct guidance in ways to work with photographs to develop strong compositions.

At the end of each day we do a review of the day's work. During the review we go over the day's themes and assess what everyone has produced that day.

I believe that demonstrations are valuable, but I have found that the most effective way to teach is through active learning. Most of the education happens while students are actively painting, and during the final review. As a

> result, workshop students come out with a much stronger sense of composition, and almost always find that their painting skills see marked improvement."

The workshop will take place at the Royal Nebeker Art Gallery of Clatsop Community College Monday-Friday April 6-10, 9:00 am – 4:00 pm.


Watermark Where to Stay in Astoria



She's coming to Astoria to repeat the session, this time with twice the amount of time for you! She will share with you her passion to transform a subject frozen in time into a living and moving experience. find a restaurant that has a view of the river and docks and promise the restaurant staff that we will have lunch there. If necessary, we can always paint small. In that case, we can talk about the glories of smaller paintings and how personal they can be.

We'll work on combining shapes to make a total of 5 to 7 shapes in a painting. We'll talk about overlapping, variety, exaggerating color and shapes, repeating colors and shapes, and simplifying one area of emphasis. We will investigate why it's important to do more than one sketch and produce 4" x 6" scribble paintings to test colors and to develop more imaginative sketches.

We'll gather in the Liberty Theater lobby and go to a Paint Out location from there.

Do-Over: New Paintings from Old Paintings – Brooks Hickerson Paint Out \$15.00

Painting Beautiful Skin Tones and Eyes with Chris Stubbs \$15.00

There are two areas that I see so many portrait artists struggle with—one is painting skin tones and shadows that glow with life. The other (continued on page 27)





area is painting eyes accurately, so that they also glow with life. Both are crucial to a great portrait!

In this session we will look at colors that make up skin tones: for Black, Caucasian, Hispanic, and Asian skin, as well as children's skin tones.

The other difficult area is eyes. Because we don't understand the anatomy of the eye, we often don't know how to paint it effectively. We will look at the steps I use to paint eyes and talk about the importance of seeing shapes as we draw the eye and look at the importance of light.

Lastly, if there is time, we'll tackle hair—how to keep it from looking like spagetti strands.

And if you are interested in one of my "anatomy" books, I will have them available for \$15—my cost. Bring your paints and brushes, some 140# arches paper, a pencil, and let's have fun!

Playing in a Watercolor Journal with Winnie Givot \$15.00

Begin or continue a watercolor journal in this hands-on class. We will explore ways to record our journeys in life as well as those in our art and travel. We will play with painting, writing, and page embellishments on watercolor paper in a simple handmade journal.

Winnie will get you started by presenting some ways to begin and develop your pages. Playing in a journal is freeing with no easel angst! Even "mistakes" are welcome as they encourage us to be more creative and find new ways of doing things.

Supply list: Watercolor journal made of good watercolor paper (see note below), Ultrafine Sharpie, palette with your favorite paint (a travel palette is ideal), brushes, container for water, old wash cloth or rag, and tissues.

Note: Winnie makes her own journals by tearing 140# full sheets (22"x30") into either 1/8 or 1/16 sheets, punching holes in the ends (1/8 $\,$

sheets) or sides (1/6 sheets) and tying the pages with a ribbon. Two sheets make a nice size journal. You will have a journal to use before and after class. However, you will be working on one journal page in class. Winnie would be delighted to see people playing in their journals, maybe taking notes, doodling, or drawing during the presentation. While playing with a 1/8 sheet of watercolor paper would be sufficient, working in a journal is much more satisfying. The completed journal also provides support for the paper you are working on.

Winnie is a Signature Member of WSO and NWWS. Her painting Fred's Fiddle won Best of Show at the 2019 Fall Convention in Bend. Winnie loves painting and teaching. She holds her popular weekly classes during the school year and for three days in the summer at the Barn Studio near Sisters. She also takes students on international painting retreats, where everyone paints and plays in a watercolor journal wherever they go. Her next trip is to Lisbon, Portugal.

We all love drawing and painting our subject; it's what warms our creative hearts. But, what about that pesky ground – background, middle ground, or foreground? Well, what if you could use those negative spaces to enhance your pictorial story? Or, if you're already

negative spaces to enhance your pictorial story? Or, if you're already pretty good at working figure and ground, do you want to dive a bit deeper into the relationship?

In this session, we will look at how the figure and ground (back, forward, or middle) relate to each other. This relationship is key to communicating your story, mood, or intentions. We will study value and color patterns and how they affect subject and ground. We will also look at placement of the subject on the picture plane.

My hope is that you will leave this session with a better insight into the potential (and fun) of the figure and ground relationship.

Activities for Friends and Family in Astoria

There are many fantastic things to do and sights to see for the families and friends of our artists who are attending the convention in Astoria. Here are few things they may do and places they may want to see.

Astoria Riverwalk

The best way to get acquainted with the true spirit of Astoria is to take a stroll on the Astoria River-Walk. Walk under the Astoria Bridge and enjoy the spectacular views of the river and this fantastic town. It is a gathering place for locals and visitors who want to explore the area and enjoy some breathtaking scenery. You can also stroll underneath the 4.1 mile-long Astoria-Megler Bridge and take in the mesmerizing river views while stopping to see the Maritime Memorial. Visit one of the many nearby shipwrecks and learn about life on the beautiful, yet dangerous Columbia River.

Columbia River Maritime Museum

Near the river you will find the Columbia River Maritime Museum. It was founded in 1962 to preserve the maritime heritage of the Columbia River region. The Museum's collection includes thousands of objects and photos as well as a research library with 10,000 publications. This museum is one of the most important sources of Pacific Northwest maritime information in the country. A range of different exhibits are featured and are designed to acquaint visitors with the powerful forces of wind and wave that can asault the Columbia River Bar. Celebrate the work of the Columbia River Bar Pilots and United States Coast Guards and take a tour of the Lightship

Columbia, a historic floating lighthouse.

Astoria Column

If you want to see a truly spectacular view of the city, you need to take a trip to Coxcomb Hill. There you'll be able take in the panoramic views of the city as well as the Columbia River, Pacific Ocean, Saddle Mountain, and the snow-covered volcanoes of the Cascade Range. Here you will find the Astoria Column, one of twelve monuments that were built to honor Astoria's early settlers. The column's light comes on every night in celebration of the city's ancestors. A beautiful hand-painted frieze spirals around the column. There is no fee to visit the column.

Astoria Column

Cannery Pier Hotel was built on 100-year-old pilings and doesn't just overlook the mouth of the great Columbia River; it actually sits on top of it. The exposed beams and wooden trusses give it a turn-of-the-century feel while resort-like amenities abound. You'll find cozy modern décor, including fireplaces, a Finnish sauna, a full-service day spa, and even the opportunity to embark on a sunset cruise aboard a 65-foot yacht.

Cannery Pier Hotel

Wreck of the Peter Iredale in Warrenton at Fort Stevens At low tide you can walk up to this 100-year-old shipwreck. The Peter Iredale ran ashore

October 25, 1906 as it was sailing to the Columbia River by way of the Oregon coast. The wreckage is still visible, making it a popular tourist attraction as one of the most accessible shipwrecks of the Graveyard of the Pacific.

Oregon Film Museum, Clatsop County If you're a movie buff, you should visit the former Clatsop County Jail, which is now home of the Oregon Film Museum. Oregon has been the location for many movies, including classics such as *Free Willy* and *Kindergarten Cop*. As most of us know the movie *The Goonies*, which is a favorite of young audiences, was filmed in Astoria. "The Goonie Gallery," at the Film Museum is filled with memorabilia from this movie. You can even film from different sets and scenes to make your own movie.

Flavel House Museum Just across the street from the Clatsop Jail is the Captain George Flavel House Museum, the very site where Mikey's father worked as a curator in *The Goonies*. Even if you don't have time to explore

the museum, the garden setting makes an ideal spot for a picture-postcard Astoria shot. If you do visit, you will step into a 19th century 11,600-squarefoot, two and a half story home welcomed by a gorgeous stained-glass window, complete with rear kitchen, butler's pantry, four-story tower, attic, and basement.

Sea Lions of the Goon Docks Just below *The Goonies* house off Leif Erickson Drive are the Astoria docks where you will find Dock 36, called the Goon Docks in the movie. It is free and, on most days, you will be able watch the sea lions lounge in the sun or frolic in the water. There are sometimes as many as 2,000 animals, though recently some of the locals have been trying to scare them off.
