President's Message

I was saddened to miss our recent fall convention in Salem due to illness. Thank you for the honor of voting me in as president despite the fact that I wasn't there and most of you don't know me.

Although I have lived in Oregon for over 50 years, minus ten years I spent in Asia, and have been a watercolorist all that time, I did not join WSO until recently. My reasoning was that since I didn't live in a metropolitan area and conventions involved travel, WSO did

not have anything to offer me. When I finally joined WSO in 2019, I found that I was so wrong. WSO offered me a great deal and brought me a connection with a whole community of wonderful people.

My daily cup of tea has little quotes on each hangtag. As I read today's quote, it made me think about my recent experience with WSO, and I decided to make this the topic of my first message as your President. Invite an acrylic painter to join WSO and let them know that all water media are now welcome. Volunteer and make even more connections.

If you reach out, what you will find is friendship and camaraderie along with a wealth of knowledge. All you need to do is jump in with both feet. Our strength is in our members; we are all connected and part of the whole. And what each of us does as an individual contributes to the feeling, tone, and overall success of WSO. Science has found that one of the keys to a long and happy life is connection, so join in today and help WSO thrive and grow.

Collective Wisdom

Novels or Non-fiction Books about Art or Artists

I'm excited to share such wonderful recommendations of books related to art. You'll find fiction and non-fiction by the artist and author of beloved children's books and titles on the "why" as well as the "how" of making art. Enjoy!

Kathryn Oliver-Garnett

I've loved the illustrations in James Gurney's Dinotopia books for children ever since I first discovered them back in the early 1990s and read them to my kids. The paintings are beautiful and accompany an entertaining and thoughtful storyline that posits a reality where most dinosaurs are not only sentient, but some of them team up and live with people.

While Gurney was writing the books, he kept a blog of his progress (Gurney Journey:

http://gurneyjourney.blogspot.com/). The interest generated among artists and aspiring artists around the blog

inspired him to write a book about what he discovered doing all the amazing paintings for the stories, *Imaginative Realism*: How to Paint What Doesn't Exist.

That book generated so many further responses and questions that he wrote another, Color and Light for the Realist Painter, which is more of a manual on the relationships between color and light through history and how various styles and techniques accomplish various effects. Also, the WSO Video Library has a wonderful DVD titled, Watercolor in the Wild, also by James Gurney, which addresses the same sort of content in the context of painting outside the studio. He uses watercolors, water brushes, watersoluble colored pencils, and ink, and presents important information about light and shadow, color and contrast. He also shares tips on putting together lightweight traveling kits. Link to WSO Video Rental Library.


Sally Bills Bailey

I just received a very special

book—hot off the press! The title is **To Be a Painter, by Hal Baker**, as told by the landscape painter and teacher Milford Zornes (1908-2008). Zornes started writing To Be a Painter in 1975; now forty-seven years later it is finally in print. This book is written by Hal Baker (Zornes' son-in-law), who waded through and organized the artist's writings, mostly found on scraps of paper often handwritten with soft pencil or charcoal. The book is also filled with dozens of Zornes' paintings and sketches. My good friend, Valerie Cohen, a former close friend and student of Zornes, and a very accomplished artist herself, sent me a copy. Link to this title on Amazon Books.

I own dozens of art books—many of them on technique and design—but my three favorite non-fiction art books focus on the "why" of painting, rather than the "how."

Steal Like an Artist—10 Things Nobody Told You About Being Creative by Austin Kleon: This lively book embraces the notion that we all learn by imitation (even the Beatles started out as a cover band). Some of my favorite quotes from this book are: "Don't steal the style, steal the thinking behind the style;" and, "The secret is doing good work and sharing it with people." <u>Link</u> to this title on Amazon Books.

The Art Spirit by Robert Henri: First published in 1923, Henri writes to his Art League students in a series of essays that resonate for the contemporary artist of today. <u>Link</u> to this title on Amazon Books.

Clear Seeing Place by Brian Rutenberg: This South Carolina abstract painter packs his book with ideas, observations, techniques, and career advice arranged into six sections designed to inspire artists of all levels. Art of Persian Art and Nature with Mojdeh Bahar

Mojdeh Bahar shared with us what inspires her in the creation of her art, including her childhood memories of travel and her life in Iran before she left in 1974. She is also influenced by the color and patterns of nature in Oregon.

She told us that Iran, known as Persia in ancient times, has a long history of magnificent art, architecture, grand palaces, and gardens going back over 2500 years to Persepolis. Cyrus the Great (600–530 BC) promoted a democratic empire that encouraged the development of many forms of art, including mirror work, tiles and mosaics.

Mojdeh continues to use historical techniques and has developed her own, sometimes unexpectedly. Once, after using graphite that turned out too dark to remove, she left it in the painting and liked the result. This has become a way to add linear designs to her work.


She uses the colors in her garden, autumn leaves, flowers, birds, and stones. A spot of bark with dappled sunlight can find its way around a tile, for instance.

By taking this session, we learned to be alert to the natural world and how we can incorporate it into our art, just as the ancient Persians did.

Ask the Queen with Kristin Bertilson

"Never put off till tomorrow what you can do today."

How many of us put off decluttering and organizing the spaces we use? I sure do!

Kristin Bertilson, President and Founder of Queen B Organizing, started her business in 2010. She is a member of the National Association of Professional Organizers, and her business can help you organize ANYTHING!

We learned that to achieve a useful space, you must visualize what you want it to look like.

- Draw a picture (we're artists, right?) of how you want your workspace to look and make decisions based on it.
- Plan a workspace with a storage area nearby for each discipline.
- Plan areas to fit your existing space and allow room for more art supplies.
- Work an hour at a time, because we don't make our best decisions when we are tired.
- Start small—one pile, cupboard, or shelf.

- Take frequent breaks.
- Clear a surface space for sorting items.
- Put sorted items close to where you will use them and leave the surface space clear.

Pouring Sunflowers in Watercolor with Michelle Myers

Michelle Myers demonstrated how to create a "definitely out-of-control controlled painting of sunflowers in watercolor." She chose only red, yellow, and blue paint and combined about 1/4 inch of these watercolors from their tubes, with one teaspoon of water into separate salsa-type cups. From the cups, she poured a bit of yellow and blue onto her paper and, using a bendable straw, blew the two colors together.

She added the red in strategic spots and continued to add and move color around by blowing onto them, finger painting, and using a spray bottle. We each did a practice piece and then, on a new sheet with drawings as a guide, started our final pieces. Responses heard around the room were, "ooh, wow" and, "this is so much fun."

Michelle used a brush to demonstrate the next steps on a dried piece, saying "put the background in and the flowers will pop in the foreground." We learned new ways of capturing hard and soft edges to allow the sunflowers to emerge through negative painting.

Paint Out at Salem's Riverfront Park Plein Air Painting with Kim Smith 1. 2. 3.

Kim Smith shared her knowledge of these three processes:

- How to organize the equipment needed for Plein Air painting in order to be efficient, portable, and supportive of the needs of watercolor painting.
- How to narrow a scene into a focused, exciting, and simplified version of the complexities in nature.
- Basic techniques needed in plein air painting, including how to establish a horizon line, block out shapes, and determine the direction of light and shadow areas.



Finally, she discussed how to use the basic elements of art to support the focus of interest and deliver a completed painting in a short period of time.

Creating a Digital Sketchbook with Elizabeth Zimmerman

Our time with Linda Kemp during this Convention was all about **design**. She spent much of the weekend (and her workshop) showing us how to improve our paintings with many tools to help us create dynamic design as we paint.

During Creating a Digital Sketchbook, Elizabeth Zimmerman taught us how to use Procreate, a powerful app available for iPad tablets, as a means to help us design or redesign our paintings while they are in progress.

Elizabeth showed us how to insert an image into Procreate (we can use the painting we are working on) and begin to use the powerful properties of the app to apply changes we envision to create a better painting without messing up our own painting in the process.

Best of all, Elizabeth promised those who were interested that she would offer further classes about using Procreate!

Tempting Trees with Alisha Whitman

Alisha began her breakout session by telling us a bit of her background and how trees inspire her. One of her talents is making trees look interesting and unique.

Her mantra: Simplicity, Movement and Variety. She says that getting the basic shapes down first is half the battle. Don't over complicate or make it predictable and be careful to not cover up all the magic that happens when creating with watercolor. One of Alisha's individual techniques that makes her paintings enjoyable is to combine collage type cutouts of her trees and incorporate them into her backgrounds to pull the trees forward, creating a stunning 3D effect.

Because art history is a passion for Alisha, she introduced us to her most loved artists and explained how many of her techniques are a direct representation of what she has learned by studying those artists. Here are a few of those inspirational artists:

Emily Carr - simple shapes and textures Lawren Harris - contrast light and dark Gustav Klimt - peaceful, stillness, and good at repeating Franklin Carmichael

Tom Thompson

And many others.

It was evident to me that Alisha's dedication, practice, and expertise have made her the artist she is today.

Dynamic Value Studies with Liquid Charcoal

Tara Choate led us in interesting new directions during her class on *Liquid Charcoal*. We learned a lot through a variety of exercises meant to explore this versatile medium. We studied value, line, and shape, and we experimented with both subtractive and additive techniques. We were led through four challenging exercises and our results were most interesting! Beauty and the Beach with JoAnn Pari-Mueller

JoAnn brought and shared feathers, driftwood, seaweed, shells, rocks, and stones which had been collected from the Oregon Coast and used as subject matter for the many paintings she presented. Two authors, Sarah Lugg and Josie Iselin, had helped launch her enthusiasm for painting found objects.

JoAnn selected several pieces and demonstrated how she would arrange them in a layout for the most pleasant composition. She pointed out that we would need to determine how many pieces to use, the format (horizontal, vertical, or diagonal), the various ways to group objects, and whether to use a white or colorful background.

We enjoyed seeing JoAnn's treatment of her five objects with the highlight being how she painted double shadows. We observed that with two light sources there were two shadows; a smaller darker one closest to the object and a lighter, larger one with a soft edge as it gets further from the subject.

JoAnn was so well prepared, generous, and enthusiastic that we all left loaded with treasures from the beach and a new appreciation of how we could render their beauty in our watercolor paintings.

Mixing Media on a Water Media Panel with René Eisenbart

The focus of this Breakout Session was to create a painting on a Water Media Panel, a birch panel coated with acrylic which creates a soft textured surface. Any medium and paint can be used on a Water Media Panel. In this session, René demonstrated the following:

- How to paint over existing paint.
- How to sand the surface of the panel, creating a surface more like hot press paper.
- How easily paint can be lifted and edges softened.
- How to scrape and scratch without damaging the paper.
- How to use white acrylic ink.
- How to apply many layers.

In addition, René increased our knowledge of numerous products and the effects they create. She challenged us to mix and match these products and ideas to create interesting and successful art.

Notan, No Problem with Beth Verheyden

Beth demonstrated the power of darks and lights in our paintings and how balancing the two effectively can make or break a composition.

The group made simple line drawings from the paintings of well-known masters and practiced the Asian art of Notan to show the areas of dark and light in order to establish a strong composition. Using N10 Copic sketch pens, students marked out the darkest areas of their chosen image to see the shapes emerge.

Through the use of a value scale, students were able to determine values 1-4 as the lightest, values 6-10 as the darkest; and that value 5 could go either way depending upon the image. Using the pen to mark out the darker values allowed us to see the shapes present and how the composition could be improved.

We learned a very helpful technique that was a great complement to Linda Kemp's critiques.

Matching Efforts for the Salem Convention and Workshop

This year I tried to resurrect an old WSO custom of members providing home stays to other members attending the 2022 Fall Convention in Salem. I expanded the cooperative notion to include ride sharing and sharing rental rooms. Published articles in the *Watermark* and the WSO website were used to generate interest and participation.

As a result, I received a few emails of encouragement and interest in the matching program, along with about five emails seeking to share rides and accommodations. Some members expressed encouragement of the matching concept but arranged their own sharing privately. I was able to match one pair who rented accommodations together. There were no offers for hosting in a home.

My intention in Matching was to encourage participation in conventions and workshops, and welcome newer members. Help and encouragement of one painter to another can make the difference between attending or staying at home. (Everything seems easier with the support of a friend.) The physical demands of driving and navigating unknown roads alone may prevent some from participation in an unknown area. The financial barriers to attendance can be reduced by sharing the cost of driving, and/or the cost of renting accommodations.

I hope that the idea of sharing catches fire. Share your time, your skills, your laugh.

Megative Painting Addicted - A Workshop with Linda Kemp

Linda teaches how to simplify design by using negative painting. Although negative painting can be challenging if you have never done it before, it forces us to concentrate on shapes. Instead of painting the objects themselves, she paints the spaces around them. One of Linda's mottos is that shapes and edges tell the story! She paints around shapes first (such as a leaf) and then adjusts the shapes (such as the serrations). She then develops depth by painting more negative layers as they recede into the background. These distant objects begin behind her earlier shapes and

extend outward as the next layer. For a landscape painting, Linda begins by negatively painting the objects closest to her (the foreground).

Linda talked about families of shapes. There are circular shapes and curved lines. Secondly, there are triangle shapes and diagonal lines. Lastly, there are square or rectangular shapes and straight lines. She demonstrated a terrific way to place tracing paper over a photo and mark the shapes. This not only allows us to improve on the size and design of the shapes, but also gives us the opportunity to use one family of shapes and (continued on page 29)

lines to create a particular style.

Linda also talked about color, especially about using "families" of color. Colors have three properties that contribute to design: hue, value, and intensity (purity). She begins with a few colors and continues using these same colors throughout the painting. She encouraged doing a painting three times, each time using one of these properties throughout. This creates harmony and unity within a painting.





Linda's passion for painting is contagious. She is a true encourager. She believes that each painting is successful if she learns something in the process. If you have never taken a workshop from Linda, you might want to consider it. You will learn a lot and have a ton of fun in the process!



Juror Workshop: Integrating Pattern, Color, and Design with Vera Dickerson Monday, April 17 - Friday, April 21, 2023

This five-day mixed media class will begin with color and value studies and the practical exercise of making collage papers as the first steps to planning and designing the paintings. Vera will show how to create lovely grays and neutrals, a range of patterns, rich mid-values, deep dark hues, rounded shapes, and sharp angular shapes as a part of your painting surface. You'll then incorporate and integrate your collage papers onto a painted surface.

Vera will demonstrate how to construct a strong, connected composition, how to break many of the "rules" of artmaking, and take chances that make your art memorable and personal. It is all about composition, color, value, line, and shape. Color has strong emotional impact, but is much more effective if played off neutrals. Discussion topics include how to choose and mix colors, with lots of short demos and some relaxed critiques led by this award-winning instructor.

In addition to collaging patterned papers, time will be spent applying and modifying stenciling on the substrate. Stencils can look quite obvious, so it is helpful to find ways to integrate the repeated patterns.

Subject matter is the choice of each artist, so participants are free to paint figure, landscape, still life, abstract, or non-objective work. Vera's own work ranges from recognizable figures in a geometric space, to totally non-objective compositions—often using the same collage elements. Whether you are a beginner or an experienced artist, you will benefit from this hands-on workshop, gaining a new perspective on how to build and design a better painting.

About the Instructor

Vera Dickerson will be coming to Oregon from her home near Roanoke, VA. She has an MFA degree in Painting and American Art from American University and has taught various studio and history courses for most of her career. In 1990, she and two friends founded The Studio School, a non-profit art school, in Roanoke. That same year she and her husband started Sketchbook Tours, taking groups of artists abroad for painting and touring trips. Vera continues to study with other artists and also knows that she learns from all of her students. In an (continued on page 36)

Online Exhibition Submissions Update

Changes to the Online Entry Form for WSO Exhibitions

When you submit your painting for the 2023 Spring Exhibition, you will find that the entry form has changed. The entry form will include four boxes for the entering artist to check.

- □ This painting is original in its concept, composition, and design, and is my creation. (The definition of original is, "Created directly and personally by a particular artist, not a copy or imitation.")
- □ I have painted this piece since February 1, 2021 (two years before the entry deadline date).
- □ This painting has not previously been juried into any WSO exhibition.
- □ I am an Active or Lifetime WSO Member with a residence in Oregon and 2023 dues paid.

The first box is most important. You, the artist, must consider whether or not your painting is original, defined as, "Created directly and personally by a particular artist; not a copy or imitation."

For instance, if you are using another's photo as a reference, have you copied the concept, is your painting about the same thing as the photo, or is it about something else? What about the composition and design? Have you created a painting with a different composition, or is yours the same as your reference?

Can you cheat? You probably could. But our desire for WSO exhibitions is for them to showcase what it means to be an artist. We want original and creative work. You can go to the internet and find copies of pretty much everything.

Copying Art

When you copy another person's artwork, including photographs, your copy is not an original; it is a copy. But, you say, I painted it; doesn't that make it an original? Whoever took the photo decided on viewpoint, composition, lighting, how much to zoom in or use a wide angle, and what the image is about, etc. So no, your painting is not an original. The definition of original is, "Created directly and personally by a particular artist, not a copy or imitation."

Copying another's art is a fantastic way to learn what another artist did to create a painting. It is a time-honored tradition at the Louvre and many other museums. But the painting you created by copying someone

else's work, no matter how good, is not original.

Using another person's photograph as a jumping-off point to create something that is uniquely your own is different than using the concept, composition, or design directly from their photo.

Consider this example: On the left is a photo that my husband took. He was delighted that I wanted to paint it and readily permitted me to use it. On the right is my painting. Although the technique I used was pouring, and although I did lots of work to make the painting succeed, I copied his photo, including the composition and the inspiration for the photo. While it's a pretty good painting, and I did make some





changes, I cannot enter it in a WSO exhibition.

I could submit it to other shows with different requirements. And I can sell it (continued on page 38)

because I have the photographer's permission, but the concept—the reason he snapped the photo—and the composition were my husband's, not mine.

For WSO exhibitions, your art needs to be original with your ideas and composition. If you see something that inspires you to paint it, and personally take the reference photo, you may certainly copy that and enter it into a WSO exhibition, as you chose the composition, viewpoint, lighting, etc.

But another person's photo? No. Please, no copying another's photo for entry into a WSO exhibition. But if you use their photo as a reference for something you want to express and then make your own? Yes, go for it. That painting would be original and could be entered.

I hope you can see the difference.

ENTRY INSTRUCTIONS, RULES, and ARTWORK REQUIREMENTS:

1. MEMBERSHIP

You must be an Active or Lifetime WSO Member with a residence in Oregon, with 2023 dues paid to enter. To renew your membership, go to: https://watercolorsocietyoforegon.com/membership/.

2. ENTRIES

- A. A maximum of two images may be submitted. Only one image by any one artist may be selected by the juror.
- **B.** Artwork must be completed within two years prior to the submission deadline.
- C. Artwork must not previously have been juried into any WSO exhibition.
- **D.** All submitted artwork must be for sale. All prices are final and cannot be changed. Keep in mind sales commissions at some galleries may be as high as 50%.
- **E.** All insurance is the responsibility of the artist.
- **F.** By entering the exhibition, you grant WSO the right to use your image for publicity purposes and to display the image on its website.

3. ORIGINALITY

- **A.** All work must be original in its concept, composition and design, and must be the creation of the artist. Original means "Created directly and personally by a particular artist; not a copy or imitation."
- **B.** If you use your own photograph as reference, you may copy it. If using another person's photograph, you <u>may not</u> copy its primary elements (concept, composition, or design). You may use it as a jumping-off point to create something uniquely your own or as a reference for adding details to your painting.
- **C.** Artwork may be critiqued by a teacher and/or critique group and must have been executed without step-by-step instruction.
- **D.** Artwork may not be altered once the image is submitted, with the exception of adding the artist's signature.

4. MEDIUMS & SUBSTRATES

Three-Dimensional Substrates

- **A.** Any archival, three-dimensional board, cradle board, panel, or canvas can be used.
- **B.** If canvas is used, it must be gallery wrapped and may be a watercolor or regular canvas.
- **C.** On all three-dimensional surfaces (cradle board or canvas), all exposed edges must be finished with paint with no staples or other hardware visible.
- D. On cradle board, works painted on paper and adhered to the cradle board are acceptable.
- **E.** Paint applied directly to the surface of the cradle board is also acceptable.
- **F.** Depth must be 2" or less.

- **G.** All surfaces must have a waterproof coating or protective sealant.
- **H.** Framing is optional for all three-dimensional surfaces (cradle board or canvas).
- **I.** If framing is chosen:
 - i. All frames must be matte black metal, free from scratches and dings.
 - ii. Maximum depth (thickness from front to back) is 2".
 - iii. Plexiglass is optional, however if used it must be clean and free from any smudges and scratches. No standard glass is permitted.
 - iv. Clips to hold the painting securely in place must be used, if needed.
 - v. A secure wire for hanging is required.
- **J. Minimum** outside dimensions are 256 square inches (height x width of outside of frame, cradle board, or canvas).
- K. <u>Maximum</u> outside dimensions are 1200 square inches (height x width of outside of frame, cradle board, or canvas).

Two-Dimensional Substrates

- **A.** Any treated or untreated archival board or paper including BUT NOT LIMITED TO: Aquaboard, Clayboard, Illustration Board, Yupo Paper, Tyvek Paper, Watercolor Paper, Rice Paper, Silk Paper, or Rag Paper are acceptable.
- **B.** A waterproof coating or protective sealant is acceptable and optional.
- **C.** Mats are optional. However, if used they must:
 - i. Have clean, sharp cut edges and corners.
 - ii. Be single or double white or off white mats only. (Any liner must be the same color as the outer mat white or off white and must be 1/2 inch or less.)
 - iii. Have no markings of any kind, including but not limited to signatures, paint, pencil, ink and titles.
 - iv. Cut mats must show the same image that was submitted on the entry form.
- **D.** A frame is required.
 - i. All frames must be matte black metal, free from scratches and dings.
 - ii. Maximum depth (thickness from front to back) is 2".
 - iii. If the painting is varnished, plexiglass is optional; however if used it must be clean and free from any smudges and scratches. No standard glass is permitted.
 - iv. Clips to hold the painting securely in place must be used, if needed.
 - v. A secure wire for hanging is required.
- E. Minimum outside dimensions are 256 square inches (height x width of outside of frame).
- **F.** Maximum outside dimensions are 1200 square inches (height x width of outside of frame).

5. MEDIA:

- A. Paintings executed in traditional watercolor on paper ARE acceptable.
- **B.** All water-media are acceptable and are defined as media that can be diluted with water when applied.
- C. Media other than water-media are acceptable but are limited to no more than 20% of the painting.
- **D.** Collage may be used with no percentage restrictions, following these guidelines: All collage materials must be the original design of the artist, executed on an acceptable substrate (as mentioned above), and using acceptable media in the percentages described above. Found items such as text clippings, computer-generated art, or documents are not permissible.
- **E.** Water-based monotypes (one pull from a plate) are acceptable.

6. PROCEDURE

- **A.** All accepted artworks must be available to hang in the exhibition. They can be shipped to a designated location or hand delivered to the exhibition location.
- **B.** Artists who do not make an accepted artwork available for the exhibition will not be allowed to enter WSO exhibitions for two years.

7. HOW TO ENTER

- **A.** Images must be in jpg format and sized at 1200 pixels on the longest side. (Please note: you are no longer required to set your image at 300 dpi.)
- **B.** Name your image as follows (example): SmithMary-GoneWithTheWind.jpg. (Please note: Do not use special characters in the file name when submitting the image.)
- C. Submit entries on the WSO website at: https://watercolorsocietyoforegon.com/wsoentry/.
