 - **Vice President** -- Chooses upcoming jurors, attends the jurors during conventions, and trains for the presidency.
 - **President** -- Has overall responsibility for WSO. Leadership and people skills are needed as well as organizational skills. The president maintains an overview, connects different parts of WSO, and helps solve problems as they arise. She/He leads the Board and Business Meetings, the Banquet, and more. Holding our conventions in a variety of cities and towns allows us to experience the beauty of areas throughout our state.

There are many advantages to holding a convention in a smaller town. Smaller towns love to have visiting groups like ours come in, bringing our business and exhibitions. Chambers of Commerce are delighted to have out-of-town visitors and often provide help with finding locations for the various aspects of our conventions as well as lodging for our members. Conventions can be held in hotels, grange halls and community centers instead of expensive convention centers. Banquets can be catered by locals. Our art exhibitions can be held at community colleges, libraries, galleries, and other venues. Conventions at smaller locales generally tend to be simpler, less expensive and delightfully different.

It is not necessary to live in an area in order to organize a convention there. Much of the planning and arrangements can now be done on the internet.

Historian Report

Art Collection Offered for Sale at Spring 2023 Convention

Who is Gerry Hart? If you were at the Spring Convention this year in Bend, you likely noticed that the WSO 100 Club was selling artwork from the collection of Gerry and Pug Hart, which was recently donated to WSO by Pug.

Gerry was a key figure in the life of WSO. She joined in 1984 and served in a number of capacities over the years, including president, tour chairman, job description chairman,

and coordinator of the annual WSO Capitol Show in the Capitol Galleria, just to mention a few. In 1996, Gerry was awarded the Outstanding Service Award. Over the years she and Pug collected a vast number of art pieces, and most of that collection was donated to us.

Do you have old WSO information?

There are many individuals from WSO's 50+ year history who served before us, paved the way, solved problems, and contributed greatly to the evolution and success of WSO. Some of them are still active members, having joined as far back as 1971. It is important that we value their contributions, honor their service, and thank them for helping to grow WSO into the organization that it is today.

I was recently given collections of materials from two of our members. One contained WSO *Watermark* newsletters and other information from as far back as 1986; the other contained merit award information from 1966 forward. Both collections contain a huge amount of history, and I am thrilled to have received them.

Collective Wisdom

Favorite Paint Applicators

The two wonderful artists below have shared insights into what they hold in their hands to make their own special magic appear in their paintings. My

thanks to the former and current WSO presidents for adding their recommendations to our collective wisdom.

Winnie Givot

Far and away my favorite brushes are Pro Arte Connoisseur 100 Series Rounds, sizes 8 - 16. They are a red sable-synthetic mix that have great spring and water carrying capacity. I have been using them for many years. I often use two of the same size, a newer one when I need the lovely point and an older one the rest of the time. They come from <u>Jackson's</u> in London and are reasonably priced. You can also get them from Amazon, which will charge you more and they will still come from Jackson's. Shipping takes 10 days to 2 weeks.

Rebecca Sentgeorge

Here are my recommendations of favorite paint applicators. I like to use things that do not have a great deal of control. I choose really old worn out brushes that don't give me as much control and switch to a good brush only on selective parts of my painting.

I get lots of little cards in my junk mail. I use them to scrape or squeegee paint onto my substrates and build

up layers of colors to create an interesting

surface to begin a

painting. Sometimes I cut notches in them for a combing effect. An insurance agent gave me a window ice scraper that I use in a similar way.

I also like to cut small squares of old t-shirts that I can wrap over my index finger and use to spread paint or to rub glaze, or to blend a color. I also use the small squares of cloth over my finger to draw with paint.

In this photo the cards are sitting on top of a surface that was made using these tools and is just waiting to be turned into a painting.


... continue Theme for August Watermark Collective Wisdom: Your Personal Guiding Principles for Creating a Work of Art

What principles are guiding your mind and heart when you transform a vision or a photograph into a watercolor painting? One example of a principle that has impacted my approach to painting is from my years in Anji Grainger's classes: "Color gets all the credit, but value does all the work." In real estate, it's "Location, location, location!" and in painting it's "Value, value, value!"

Important News from the Membership Director

Welcome to our returning members and 47 new members that have joined for 2023. We look forward to the energy and friendships these new and returning members bring to WSO.

There are several important issues that I want to highlight:

- 1. For members who renewed by December 31, 2022, please check the 2023 Membership Roster & Handbook for your information, and contact me by email with corrections or additions. My email address can be found in the Membership Roster & Handbook. I added an addendum to the recently mailed 2023 Roster. An additional Roster addendum will be mailed with the Exhibition Catalog. You'll find WSO policies in the 2023 Membership Roster & Handbook, pages 26-40.
- 2. We are receiving an increasing amount of "returned mail," including the Roster Handbook. WSO policies state that mail is not forwarded: <u>Policy XI.G.</u> (page 40). The rising cost of postage makes the expense prohibitive.
- 3. Please review **Membership Policies** (pages 39 and 40). We were flexible by not enforcing the policy stringently during the pandemic and the associated stressors. Beginning this year WSO will adhere to the policy more diligently. Specifically, note the policy related to "Signature Membership" and "Lapse of Membership:" <u>Policy XI. Membership Policies</u>, F. Lapse of Membership 1 & 2 (page 40).* Several people did not renew by the specified date of December 31. It states that a lapse in membership will result in a member losing their original join date, you will be "rejoining" after December 31. In addition to this, you would be at risk of losing your Signature Status. Please renew on time to keep your hard-earned Signature Status, and original join date. We want to support you in the best possible way.

*Note, under F. 1. (See Policy II. E. 2. a-d) the "E. 2. a-d." should be changed to "F. 2."



Fundraising for Artists' Success and Growth



Inspiration . . .

If inspiration is what we're all seeking when we paint, then the WSO Spring Convention was the place to be. Great camaraderie, knowledgeable instructors and amazing demos! Congratulations to WSO for another wonderful event!

It was a proud and very affirmative experience to hear the words "sponsored by the WSO 100 Club" mentioned over and over again when the award winners were announced at the banquet. It makes the weeks and months of work and preparation feel so worthwhile. Thank you to all the members who helped make this convention a successful fundraising event for the 100 Club – and YOU!

Fundraising and Endowments . . .

The 100 Club builds our annual budget so that the fundraising that happens at the WSO conventions provides a major portion of the Artists' Awards prize payout, with the rest of the award money coming from other fundraising efforts or the endowment. At this 2023 Spring Convention, we were very successful -- which means we are better positioned for Artists' Awards at the Fall Convention. However, we still have our work cut out for us!

Not everyone has a clear understanding of how endowments work. Basically, they are professionally managed investment funds that gain, or decline, with the overall investment market. Each year The 100 Club is allowed a very small, single-digit percentage withdrawal, or "draw down," to use for awards and education programs for WSO members. For example, if the endowment is \$1000 and the single-digit percentage drawdown is 4%, then the amount of money that can be withdrawn is \$40. The remaining \$960 remains in the endowment and continues to grow in value based on how the money is invested. That draw down does not cover the full amount required for either program without significant additional annual fundraising activities.

The 100 Club is a focused and determined organization . . .

Through some serious and intense work on the development of our five-year strategic plan, we know that, while the WSO membership will always continue to be a major partner in fundraising efforts, we must work on developing other income venues and patronages as well. Our long range goal is to build both endowments to be self-sustaining. To make that happen, we need approximately \$120,000 in additional market value between the two endowments.

Right now, we are just taking our very first steps in branching out into other areas such as: 1) obtaining grants for educational programs, 2) identifying and soliciting true "patrons of the arts" as major donors, and 3) building our "100 Club Lifetime Patron" membership. We need all the help we can get, so please reach out to me. We welcome ideas or resources from all of you! Please contact me with your questions, comments, or suggestions. My contact information is available in the *Membership Roster & Handbook*.

These things won't happen overnight. It will be a slow process. But if we can do it well, it will be worth all the time, energy, and commitment to ensure we have financing for our future artists' success and growth!

Back to Inspiration . . .

Let me leave you with lyrics that have resonated with me for many years. They are from the album Buffalo Café by singer-songwriter Jack Gladstone, a member of the Blackfoot Nation near Glacier National Park in Montana.

"The purest gift is not of gold, but in art that awakens the soul."







Reviews of Breakout Sessions for the 2023 Spring Convention

Go Travel — Make Art! with René Eisenbart

René's enthusiasm inspired us to be ready for travel, with art kits sized appropriately to one's trip. For her basic kit, she uses a Vaschy case and includes a variety of pens and pencils; several favorite brushes: a 1/4 inch striper and a #8 Travel Brush, both by Silver Black Velvet; and a Princeton 1.5 inch Angled Flat Wash. She travels with gorgeous M. Graham paints in a small rubber-sealed palette by Falling in Art. She warned us to allow ample time for M. Graham paints to set up to prevent these paints from running into each other. René also has a tiny paint kit using Viviva Colorsheets and only a few tools.





She shared examples of artists painting, collaging, and stenciling on maps. An online "Art on Maps" search can lead you too into this creative realm.

René set us up to trace and paint a map on translucent film by Dura-Lar, creating a surprisingly bright painting. We certainly learned exciting tips for travel and techniques for using maps in our art.

The Pleasure of Drawing with Winnie Givot

Winnie's goal was to remind us that drawing regularly maintains skill and boosts our mood. Encouraging us to temporarily switch off the logic-oriented left brain and escape into the judgment-free right brain, Winnie led us in drawing:

- **Blind Contour** Study an object (leaf, poppy pod, scissors). Without looking at the paper, use a pen to make a continuous line drawing without lifting the pen until the drawing is complete. Participant comment: "I felt free, smiling throughout."
- **Upside Down** Without studying it, rotate a master's drawing 180 degrees so the bottom edge becomes the top edge. Draw the top and left borders and re-create the drawing freehand. Focus on the relationship between lines, remembering, "It's all just shapes!" Responses: "I noticed things not seen in the original." "The critic in my head was quiet!"
- **Negative Space** View an object through a viewfinder, with part of the object spilling past your view. Draw and blacken the shapes BETWEEN the borders and the object, leaving the form of the object blank white. Comment: "Seeing just shapes suddenly became much easier!"

Is It Done Yet? with Liz Walker

Liz presented an honest, inspiring, and humorous talk that opened this viewer's eyes and exceeded expectations.

It takes real discipline to leave your painting alone!

Get into a critique group with trusted friends who will "see" things that do not serve the painting. Listen to jurors when they tell you what makes a good painting.







The before and after visuals showed concrete examples of how to turn a good painting into a better one. These artists thought their piece was finished but look what happened...

- An artist turned a daytime landscape into a more dynamic night scene by changing the color temperature.
- Another noticed something that didn't work in the painting AFTER winning an award and took it out of the frame to "fix" it, which brought an audible "Oh Wow!" gasp from participants.
- A musician with drumsticks in hand was enhanced by changing the static drumsticks to drumming in motion, a huge difference.
- A lone figure in the center became more dynamic with the addition of supporting characters.

Is it done yet? That depends. What emotion do you want to convey? Keep that stack of old paintings for future potential. Don't give up. Maybe you don't have the skills to finish it now, but you might in the future.

Let's Get Moving with Beth Verheyden

Beth Verheyden likes to invite the viewer into her paintings with visual movement. She shared her knowledge of how to achieve this by giving us several tips and examples. These included repeating shapes and softening edges, using lines and blurred edges to show the direction and feel of the motion.

Four techniques to help create dynamic movement:

- Paint through wet edges
- Repeat a directional line or shape next to a moving shape
- Add drybrush marks within the shape that's moving
- Lift out paint using a Magic Eraser

Beth's final suggestion was to paint what moves you, take risks, and expect a breakthrough.

Fun with Paint Pours with Kim Smith

The unexpected addition of the breakout session on acrylic paint pouring was fun and inspiring. Kim first explained the process of pouring acrylic paint, reviewed all the required materials, and then did a demo for the class, where she showed us different techniques. We learned that adding silicone would create "cells," like little





swirls! And as a bonus, the run-off paint made acrylic skins that we can use in other applications.

What came next was the thrill of doing the paint pours ourselves with Kim's materials. We chose our colors and layered them in a small cup, which we placed upside down on a small wood disk. We then lifted the vessel and watched the mixture of colors spread over the disk, creating beautiful tiny masterpieces!

It was so creative and fun that we each made at least two pieces. Coat the disks with resin and apply cork to the bottoms, and voila! We would have coasters! She also brought several examples of how paint pours could be applied on many surfaces and sealed with many different products.

The pouring process could be the background for a painting or stand alone. We all left the class inspired!

Forest for the Trees: Exploring the Freedom of Gestural Painting with Molly Freitag

Molly's emphasis was to help us develop a special attitude or spirit of the heart to create paintings that say what's needed by invoking memories, ideas, emotions, and even the spiritual world.

We played with small 1/8th sheet paintings and began with no plan or judgment, using only imagination to explore what could come from within. She told us that once the painting is started, it will tell you what it needs next. The artist must practice trusting this process and look for unexpected things to happen. The artist can take what the painting gives, staying





open to exploring and believing good things will happen.

Molly shared the Gerhard Richter quote, "One has to believe in what one is doing." Commit to looking inward, be playful, and experiment. This approach will lead to visionary paintings that are uniquely yours.

After we worked on small paintings, we had time to explore a larger one. This creative approach is an enjoyable way to think about painting; for many of us, it can lead to something totally different.

Creative Backgrounds with Jacqueline Newbold

Jacqueline welcomed us with many examples of the wonderful journals that she has made over the years. We could see how her sketches and paintings described her many trips.

She provided gesso, a sketch of Bend's Old Mill District, and a forest service map for our project. We applied a few





drops of Gesso onto the map; the color and consistency of the Gesso applied to the surface was transparent enough that we could still make out the map lines. We sketched what we wanted on the map. Many of us drew the Old Mill District, but I saw one artist draw a beautiful elk on their Gesso map. We all began by painting the sky with a mixture of cobalt and cerulean watercolors. Then each person chose the colors they wanted for the rest of the map. The last step was to outline in pen or ink some of the icons of Bend, Oregon, such as the rounded mountains, the river, and the Old Mill smokestacks. It was nice to bring the Deschutes River into view. I decided I wanted the mood of my painting to be a historical one. I feel that it tells of a time when the lumber mill was operating in Bend. I thoroughly enjoyed Jacqueline's class and appreciated her providing the map, gesso, and the sketch of the Mill District.

An Artist's Journey with Michelle Lindblom

Michelle is a performance painter. While listening to instrumental music, and with no plan in mind, she paints on large, textured canvases. Michelle's twenty-four years of collegelevel teaching, drawing and painting have prepared her for this style.

Early in the process, she uses a lot of water and up to four acrylic colors to later reveal what's underneath. She frequently turns her canvas to get a different perspective. Trying not to overthink, she listens to music for inspiration. Using her motto, "Just let



things happen," Michelle often brings her painting to the point of chaos, then brings it "back down," allowing a more conscious effort to guide her.

The "mystery" of her work draws us in to reveal our interpretation. Freedom to paint intuitively is a worthy goal, and Michelle demonstrated this unique style very effectively.

Painting Our Pets and Animals with Chris Stubbs

I felt like I was given a piece of double chocolate candy and craved more!

Chris Stubbs did an excellent job of demonstrating painting fur with soft edges "in order to get," as she said, "tiny 'creeping' edges of paint that resemble soft fur, without resorting to masking the heck out of the fur."

We learned that getting the best results takes a lot of practice, patience, and observation. Chris blended light/dark fur so it looked real, with no hard edges.

I put my paintbrush down and never stopped watching Chris show us what to do; some painted, some drew, but mostly we watched.

Chris discussed the eye anatomy of dogs and cats, and how light is reflected in the pupils. While she was painting an eye, she told us that the pupils of dogs and larger cats are round, while those of smaller cats and alligators are elliptical.

She showed us how to pull out single whiskers or hairs using masking or Nichiban tape.

This was an excellent demonstration that could could easily become a longer session as I craved more, just like my double chocolate.

Juror Workshop with Vera Dickerson

What a treat for those of us who were lucky to attend Vera Dickerson's 5-day workshop, "Integrating Pattern, Color, and Design." She challenged our creativity and stretched our imagination in ways most of us had never experienced before. We eagerly devoured her instructions and spent our days immersed in a whirlwind of materials and an explosion of color!

On day one, we learned how to create our own collage papers using plain waxed deli paper, stencils, roller brushes, and acrylic paints. In a beehive of messy activity, we endeavored to create an array of values, tones, and colors, layering one or more stencil patterns over solid colors.

Day two included a demonstration and exercise on how to compose a collage using a sealed

canvas for a base and incorporating collage elements, acrylic paint, and direct stenciling around the central image.

On day three Vera critiqued each work, giving us direction on our pieces regarding mark-making and adjusting values. Later Vera shared a slideshow of some of her artworks, as well as images of her favorite artists' paintings and explained why she is drawn to them.

On day four we set the tone for our next painting on watercolor paper by using (continued on page 27)

a base color mixed with Vera's special recipe for the sealant. Then direct stenciling indicated heavier values where needed as we drew our simple chosen images into place. We learned a variety of flourishes using white and black gesso, Saran wrap, and aluminum foil.

Vera critiqued the week's work again on the final day and the attendees spent the remaining hours finishing artwork, adding small accents, refining edges, or beginning new pieces.

Vera was the epitome of all the qualities we look for in a juror: warm, encouraging, knowledgeable, efficient, energetic, and so darn likeable! The Brooks Room at Trinity Episcopal was the ideal setting for the workshop and attendees regularly arrived early and worked through lunchtime

ENTRY INSTRUCTIONS AND RULES

Artwork Requirements:

- 1. You must be an Active WSO member, residing in Oregon, with 2023 dues paid, to enter.
- 2. To renew your membership, go to: www.watercolorsocietyoforegon.com/membership/, click on "Renew Your Active Membership" and follow the prompts.
- 3. A maximum of two images may be submitted.
- 4. All selected paintings shall be by a different WSO member.
- 5. Work shall be completed within two years of the submission deadline.
- 6. Work may be critiqued by a teacher and/or a critique group.
- 7. All work must be original in its concept, composition, and design, and must be the creation of the artist. The definition of original: created directly and personally by a particular artist, not a copy or imitation.
- 8. The painting has not previously been juried into any WSO exhibition.
- 9. Work shall be executed without step-by-step instruction.
- 10. Artwork may not be altered once the image is submitted, except for adding the artist's signature, and artwork must match the submitted image exactly.
- 11. Single or double mats in white or off-white only are acceptable, but optional. No colored liners.
- 12. Frames must be matte black metal with a maximum depth of 2", with minimum outside dimensions of 256 square inches and maximum outside dimensions of 1200 square inches.
- 13. Paintings must be covered with Plexiglas (acrylic), not with glass.

Mediums and Substrates:

- 1. The Fall Watercolor Exhibit is open to water media that can be reactivated by water.
- 2. Water media shall consist of paintings that are predominantly watercolor.
- 3. Work must be on a single piece of untreated paper; plastic paper such as Yupo and Tyvek are not allowed.
- 4. Acrylic, gesso, pastel, collage, ink, embossing, varnished works, and canvas supports are not accepted.

Procedures:

- 1. All accepted paintings must be available and delivered to the convention exhibition.
- 2. Artists who do not make an accepted painting available for the exhibit will not be allowed to enter WSO exhibitions for two years.

How to enter:

- 1. Go to www.watercolorsocietyoforegon.com; click Exhibitions. On the drop-down menu, select "Guide to Entering a WSO Show."
- 2. RESIZE your image to 1200 pixels on the longest side. The WSO website now has a resizing tool. Access at watercolorsocietyoforegon.com; click Exhibitions. On the drop-down menu, select "How to Resize Images."
- 3. RENAME your image as follows (example) SmithMary-GoneWithTheWind.jpg
- 4. Note: No special characters can be used in the file name when submitting the images.
- 5. Submit entries on the WSO website: www.watercolorsocietyoforegon.com; click Exhibitions. On the drop-down menu, select "Submit Artwork."

Jurer Werkshop: Chasing Wender - Find Inspiration Combining Words with Watercolors with Trish McKinney Monday, October 9 - Friday, October 13, 2023

In this five-day mixed media workshop, using watercolor, mark making and collage, Trish states that students will learn how to reinvent their paintings through the use of words and watercolor. Students will learn how to create strong compositions, strengthen design, use playful collage, paint acrylic transparently and use words as exciting textural backgrounds. Through it all, students will learn to recognize their muse, chasing wonder along the way.

All art forms, painting and creativity, begin with that moment of wonder. Recognizing these moments and combining them with words creates a deeper meaning that can inspire, heal, and make magic.

Trish McKinney is a national and international award-winning artist, instructor, graphic designer, published author and illustrator. Her unique mixed water media paintings are about being aware of a moment and sharing her wonder by telling the story. She especially loves the unpredictable surprise and spontaneous nature of watercolor and combining layers of meaning in her painting through words and unexpected shapes. In her words "Being aware of wonder – that moment when you pause for beauty, for sparkling, incandescent light – and the magical awareness of emotion... these are the things I savor and adore. I love weaving a story through the

use of color, words, shapes, lines and texture – inspiring the viewer to tell their own story." She loves to ask "what if" when she works in her studio because it leads her to a new discovery.

Trish is a signature member of the Ohio Watercolor Society and has been a juror for many exhibitions.
