Some of the paintings were framed in the black metal frames we have come to expect in a WSO exhibition and some took advantage of the rules allowing unframed work that has been varnished. The show was a wonderful mix of traditional watercolor and experimental watermedia. It was a great way to show the public that the Watercolor Society of Oregon embraces all forms of watermedia. The quality of the work in this show was outstanding with an interesting mix of objective and abstract. Our juror, Vera Dickerson, had guite a job narrowing down her

choices of the 80 paintings she juried into the show and then the 20 award winners.

On take-in day it was a joy to see the paintings in person as they were brought in. The Barber Library at COCC was a wonderful venue that allowed the viewer to circle the foyer to view the paintings, then enjoy more on the stairway to the next level. The viewer could then circle around again to view all 80 paintings, then thread back past them all the way back down the stairs.
