
In Memoriam Dolores Elaine Ribal



Planned Giving: A Rundown of Your Options

The bylaws of the WSO 100 Club define our purpose as "the advancement of watercolor art and artists in Oregon through public education and activities." When you combine that with our Charter statement, which defines the 100 Club as the "foundational fundraising arm for WSO," and our Value Statement, which states that we are "Financing Artists' Success and Growth," it is clear the 100 Club is focused on two basic activities: 1) fundraising and 2) payout

of cash awards and educational grants. While the second item is pretty clearly defined, the first item—fundraising—is open to a variety of ideas, methods and options. One of those options is Planned or Legacy Giving.

Planned or Legacy Giving

Planned Giving is when you leave a legacy gift as part of your trust or will. This type of charitable bequest is a common, simple way to include the 100 Club in your estate planning and protect the future of the awards and education programs as well as the 100 Club organization overall. A bequest to the 100 Club is usually free from federal

and state taxes and can be made outright, in memoriam, or contingent upon an event. You have the option to provide either immediate benefits to existing programs or to establish a gift that will allow your memory to live on in a way that is meaningful to you.

Depending on the type of gift you make, you or your estate can enjoy certain tax advantages. Here are just a couple of examples:

- To lower your tax burden during your lifetime, you can create a life insurance policy with the 100 Club as the beneficiary and claim the annual cost as a charitable donation.
- The amount of the bequest as stated in your trust or will is deducted from your estate total and can offer a substantial savings by decreasing the value of the estate subject to taxation.

The key to estate planning is deciding how you would like to distribute your assets, including any savings, investments, real estate, or personal property.

The 100 Club has several types of Planned Giving (continued on page 15)

donations that you can make and is currently set up to receive any of the following:

- a. <u>Unrestricted Donation</u>: An unrestricted donation to the Awards Program and/or the Education Program in any amount.
- b. <u>Restricted Endowment</u>: Restricted endowments have their principal held in perpetuity, while funds, according to a specified formula, are drawn from the invested assets to be expended per the donor's specification. NOTE: There are some restrictions to this type of endowment. If you are considering a "restricted endowment," contact the 100 Club first to discuss how we can make sure that the proper language is included so that your generosity meets its intended goals.
- c. <u>Planned or Legacy Giving</u>: This means you can leave a legacy gift (either restricted or unrestricted) as part of your trust or will.

Planned Giving is the perfect opportunity to reflect on what has been important in your life and what you would like to see supported for future generations. If you have any questions, please contact me. You will find my contact information in the *Membership Roster & Handbook*.



Breakout participants will get to try out the techniques shown; and as participants paint, Chris will walk around the room to provide helpful advice.



Harold Walkup - Understanding Wet-in-Wet Watercolor Techniques, \$15

Harold demonstrates the wet-in-wet technique for a snow painting, showing the key steps to completion.

With just three pigments, you can create more colors than you can imagine. Winnie paints all her portraits with the same three staining transparent pigments. This hands-on session will teach you how to create some of the beautiful colors possible with this triad. The advantages of only using three pigments are that they make a harmonious painting, and you can easily replicate the colors. Plus, as you use them, you get to know the properties of the pigments well. Winnie will guide the participants in creating a range of colors from vibrant to neutral and from pale white to deep black. You will learn how to match colors as well as how to mix several gorgeous greens from three pigments, bringing liveliness and suggesting reality in your paintings.

Margaret Godfrey - Masked and Taped Up, \$15

Watch Margaret demonstrate the use of masking film and various types of tape to save shapes and create patterns in her paintings. She will describe how and why she uses each masking item and share a handout naming each material. In her demonstration, she will show how her methods help her generate interest, break up space, and save areas to paint later in her process.


