### Ten Things You Might Not Know About the WSO 100 Club

You bought your raffle ticket or responded to the annual appeal, but how much do you know about the WSO 100 Club? Is it a *club*? What does "100" mean? Read on and learn all about us!

#### 1. When did it start?

The 100 Club was founded by WSO members Chris Keylock Williams and Gloria Heisley Webber in 1984, as a response to the relentless task of soliciting sponsors for artist awards at WSO's bi-annual exhibitions.

2. Why is it called "100 Club"?

Chris and Gloria got a group of 26 people to each donate \$100 to a fund that they hoped would grow and produce interest income to help fund the awards. Hence, the "100 Club" name.

3. Is the 100 Club part of WSO?

Not legally. The WSO 100 Club, Inc. was established as a separate 501(c)(3) tax deductible non-profit entity in 1992, with its own board of directors and bylaws.

4. So how is the 100 Club connected to WSO?

The 100 Club's mission is to "manage, maintain, and grow endowments to provide funding for WSO artist awards and educational programs." So, we are joined at the hip in support of WSO artists, but are separate organizations.

## 5. How much money is in the endowments?

The answer varies with the state of the financial markets. The 100 Club manages two endowments — an awards endowment and an education endowment with each fund invested and ear-marked for those specific purposes. The combined market value of the endowments at the end of 2024 was nearly \$350,000. Not bad, from a starting point of \$2,600 in 1984!

6. Who manages all that money? The 100 Club has a board of directors that is responsible for stewardship of the endowments. In addition, we hire a professional investment

manager to oversee the endowment investments.

7. How much money does the 100 Club provide to WSO each year?

- This is a decision made by the 100 Club each year, depending on need and budget. We fund the awards at each of the bi-annual exhibitions, for a total of \$10,040 planned in 2025. In addition, we currently fund up to \$2,000 each year in educational grants to the WSO Critique Groups.
- 8. How can I learn more about the education grants for Critique Groups? Details about the current education grant program are available on the WSO website at <u>WSO Critique</u> <u>Group Workshops</u>. Work is in progress to refine and broaden the program, so stay tuned for updates.
- 9. Given the size of the endowments, why does the 100 Club keep fundraising? Endowments are managed with the goal of maintaining (or growing) the principal value of the investments. The 100 Club can draw down up to 4% of the principal each year. That's not enough to fully fund the WSO awards and education programs plus the expenses of managing the endowments. Hence, the need for fundraising. In addition, fundraising helps increase the size of the endowments, moving us closer to where the endowments are self-sustaining and able to fully fund the programs.
- 10. Who donates to the 100 Club?

Our donors include **everyone who supports 100 Club fundraising** by buying raffle tickets or bidding in a silent auction or responding to the year-end annual appeal. **Local and national companies** donate goods and gift certificates. **WSO artists** donate paintings and workshop vouchers. WSO members who have made a one-time \$100 donation to the 100 Club are marked as **WSO 100 Patrons** in the roster. The **WSO Critique Groups** have been outstanding donors in recent years — donating almost \$3500 in 2024. Finally, there have been significant donations via **planned giving** — as in 2024 when the Chris Williams estate designated \$50,000 to go to the awards endowment.

# Video Conferencing Options for Critique Groups

Zoom may be the best-known video conferencing application, but there are other good choices as well. Zoom requires a paid subscription for meetings over 40 minutes long. If your critique group is having a problem with the cost of a paid Zoom

subscription, it may be worth considering alternatives.

#### Reduce your cost of using Zoom

A paid Zoom subscription currently starts at about \$160 per year, which is substantial if only one person is paying for it. Some critique groups which meet via Zoom divide the subscription cost among all the members. For example, dividing the cost among an 8-member group would make that a more affordable \$20 per member per year.

Alternatively, a group could work with the 40-minute limitation of free Zoom meetings by setting up back-to-back 40-minute meetings in advance.

#### Alternatives to Zoom

Some of your group members may already have subscriptions to "cloud" services such as Google Workspace, Microsoft 365, or Apple iCloud. If so, their subscriptions may include access to video conferencing.

Several of these video conferencing alternatives also have free options, although the free meetings generally have time limits.

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## Video Conferencing Options ... continued

#### **Use Google Meet**

If a member of your group has a Google Workspace subscription, they can set up meetings on Google Meet lasting up to 24 hours. Participants in these meetings don't have to have a Google subscription. Participants can join via the Google Meet application or via a web browser.

Anyone with a free Google account can set up a Google Meet meeting, but free meetings are limited to 60 minutes each.

You can see an overview of Google Meet at Google Workspace.

#### Use Microsoft Teams

Many owners of Windows PCs subscribe to Microsoft 365 to keep their Microsoft applications up to date. Microsoft 365 subscribers can set up Microsoft Teams meetings lasting up to 30 hours. Participants in the meeting don't have to have a Microsoft subscription. Participants can join via the Microsoft Teams application or via web browser.

Anyone can sign up for free to set up Microsoft Teams meetings, but free meetings are limited to 60 minutes each.

You can see an overview of Microsoft Teams at Microsoft Conferencing.

#### Use Apple FaceTime

Owners of Apple devices such as Macs, iPhones, or iPads can set up FaceTime meetings of up to 32 participants for free. Documents such as images or PowerPoint slides can be shared during a FaceTime meeting, similar to the other video conferencing applications. Meetings can be joined on an Apple device via the FaceTime app. Participants on other devices such as Windows PCs or Android devices can join via web browser.

#### Try them out!

Find the videoconferencing application that works for you and your group! You might try experimenting with your chosen tool before trying a real meeting as controls vary among different applications.

## Looking Ahead

Announcing a Convention Management Reorganization and New Volunteer Roles

I have witnessed a significant decline in members willing to chair conventions simply because it is a daunting task that fewer and fewer of our members are willing to take on. As a result, I have found myself handling more event functions. I've decided to continue in this direction, but with a restructuring of how we manage these large events in hopes of more consistency, fiscal responsibility, and ease for all who volunteer.

First, I will take on all the contracting and management of venues including all food and beverages to help build sustainable budgets that efficiently incorporate all the potential expenses.

Second, I would like to build a Convention Services Team to handle certain items for a minimum of 2-4 conventions (2-year commitment ideally). It only takes one time to become greatly experienced, so it's most efficient for volunteers and WSO to maintain the same coordinating duties for more than one convention. The more one does the job, the easier it becomes. We already incorporate this idea with our hospitality and vendor coordinators, so I think it is worth investigating this approach for the whole team.

The new positions include:

- Breakout Session Coordinator(s). This is a chance for you to develop an on-going curriculum and work with the Education Director on topics of interest.
- Juror Critique Coordinator. This involves 2 weeks of work the month prior to the convention.
- Exhibit Brochure Designer. This involves about 10 hours of design work the month prior to convention.
- Communications Coordinator. This involves all internal and external convention publications, blasts, *Watermark* notices, publicity, etc.

I have and will provide written job descriptions for all the above Coordinator positions if you are interested. Consider being part of a lively and dynamic convention team. I encourage you to volunteer now! It's an excellent way to integrate fully into WSO and get to know a lot of great artists!

We also need local members and short-term volunteers in each convention host city to help with exhibit installation, receptions, awards dinner, workshop coordinating, and anything else that arises. Ideas for cities and locations are always welcome from the WSO membership. This is a great opportunity to nominate a host city and become a short-term volunteer.

I believe this plan is worth investigating to see if our conventions can operate with better consistency, wisdom, creativity, and efficiency, while reducing the burden on any one volunteer. I am happy to answer questions if you are interested in any of these new Coordinator positions. Thank you for your support!

## **Breakout Session Reviews**

Judy Cox — Set up For Still life

Judy discussed setting up dynamic still lifes utilizing principles of composition including various shapes, sizes, colors and values of objects. Start with the tallest object and arrange from there keeping in mind the rules of thirds and odd numbers.

Lighting is essential. If lacking studio lighting,

one can use daylight lamps, flashlights, and reflected light and think about shadows to add focus and interest.

We then practiced setting up fun still lifes with the various objects provided.

### Alisha Whitman — Watercolor Collage

Alisha Whitman, a clear and organized teacher, began with a list of ways to use collage, starting with cutting out parts of old paintings you like and collaging them to other paintings. She listed many benefits of using collage: you don't have to worry about backgrounds, you can rearrange elements when you don't have a plan, you can cut up a whole painting and rearrange the pieces, you can use scraps or cut up pieces of similar color and glue them on for texture. All encouraging us to be creative. Then she let us go, cutting up unsatisfactory paintings with x-acto knives and scissors and gluing them in place. As we were working, other techniques were mentioned including sewing pieces together by hand or machine or actually embroidering the painting. An example of this was shown in the 2nd Juror's Critique.

Alisha shared benefits and ways to use collage, including:

- 1. A good use of old paintings and scrap papers.
- 2. A chance to learn about colors and textures.
- 3. A chance to play around without attachment to outcome.

It was a very inspiring workshop for all of us with ideas coming as we cut and played. FUN! I plan to continue with several of her ideas at home.

## Deanna St. Martin — Techniques, Textures & Special Effects on Yupo

A lover of experimenting with liquid watercolors on large pieces of Yupo, Deanna showed us how to create textured subject matter on solid color by using gatorboard, push pins, Halloween cobwebs, liquified primary watercolors in spray bottles (Robert Doak Watercolors mixed with water and Paint Easy), clear laminate, and acrylic paint.

She demonstrated how she creates her unique artwork by first crisscrossing cobwebs over the Yupo on gatorboard, using push pins to secure the cobwebs in place. She thoroughly saturated the paper and cobwebs with water using a large brush, and after letting the puddles dry a bit, sprayed the three primaries in select areas of the piece. After letting it dry completely and removing the cobwebs, she cut out the subject matter (in this case, two birds) from the clear laminate, and affixed it to the piece. She then mixed blue acrylic paint with very little water and used a roller to spread the paint over the entire surface, including the laminate. When the acrylic dried, she removed the laminate exposing the gorgeous subject matter of the two birds.

Deanna concluded by showing us amazingly colorful examples of her work on Yupo, inspiring us to thoroughly explore this technique in the future.

### Ann Ebert — Exploring the World of Watercolor Surfaces

Have you given much thought to the origins of the paper we use to create our art? Ann Ebert of Central Art in Medford gave us an extensive look at how paper evolved. Ann is the co-owner of a long-time family-owned art supply business in Medford.

Ann took us through papermaking in the Middle East where cotton, flax and hemp were used through Europe and Spain. Papermaking involves

making suspension of fibers in water and forcing this suspension to drain through a screen, to produce a mat of interwoven fibers. Water is removed from this mat using a press.

In 1806, Henry and Sealy Fourdrinier received a patent for the press. This paper making machine became the basis for most modern papermaking, including 100% cotton watercolor paper.

Ann was an interesting and informative speaker. After she spoke about the history of paper right down to the weight and roughness, she passed around samples of many kinds of watercolor paper.

She included new kinds of paper made from agave and sugar cane currently sold by Hahnemuhle. In closing, Ann passed around several new products in the market and commented on their uses. Central Art was one of the vendors at the Grants Pass convention and after a lively discussion most of us headed to their tables.

## Lynda Hoffman-Snodgrass — Layers in Abstraction

Lynda's breakout session was designed to be an exercise in creating a painting using intuitive layered abstraction. By using watercolors that layer like stained glass, and limiting the palette to three primary colors, we were able to create twelve, six inch square paintings on one full sheet of watercolor paper.

Lynda brilliantly led us through painting the layers, suggesting beginning with light values, then a

second layer of mid values, then finally finishing the piece with darker values, each layer creating more and more depth. She encouraged us to use a variety of brushes, from flats to rounds in different sizes, to create intuitive marks to enhance and finish our compositions. Although we all were instructed in the same techniques, each artist painted in their own unique style, creating some very different outcomes.

### René Eisenbart — Paper Plus

René guided us through the process of mixing grounds that provide a wonderful surface for our watercolor paintings. She uses a mixture of mediums she developed that are inexpensive and provide a whole new set of creative possibilities for us. She even gave us a pre-surfaced paper and samples of the mediums so we could jump right in and start creating! These grounds allow us to create very interesting textures while also improving the liftability of our paints.

We used the ground on watercolor paper, but it can be used on board as well. René is a really great teacher with a sense of humor who does wonderful demos and is very skilled at guiding participants through the creative process. We all made exciting new inroads into painting with these grounds.

### Jeannine Miller — Abstract Starts

Jeannine showed us how she starts her paintings using abstract starts. Using painter's tape, she tapes off areas that overlap her drawing creating the underlying abstract design. These areas remain unpainted in the initial washes of loose color, creating a unique look to her paintings.

In advance of the breakout, Jeannine emailed and provided the participants with a drawing of a rooster



to use or gave us permission to bring our own image on 140 lb. cold press paper. After a lecture and demo by Jeannine, we created our underlying abstract shapes with painter's tape. Next, we mixed paints from the tube with water in small cups in preparation to begin painting. We also experimented in creating textures with salt and rubber cement glue. Jeannine demonstrated removing the tape and beginning the second layer of the painting by starting at the focal point. We painted the Rooster's eye and will finish the painting on our own. It was a lively breakout enjoyed by all.

### Marianne Nielsen — Painting Realistic Animal Eyes

Marianne demonstrated how to best render both dog and cat eyes so that your painting is realistic. The eyes are the most important part of any portrait, either animal or human, and getting the shape and the light correct will make or break the painting. We were able to paint along with Marianne to create small paintings of both dog and cat eyes. Then we moved on to pen and ink images of a dog's nose and then used masking fluid to add whiskers to a cat's face.

### Margaret Godfrey — Capturing a Moment Telling Story

Margaret shared her process of selecting which reference photos she uses for potential paintings, focusing on ways that she could change those reference photos to create a better story within the painting. She does that oftentimes by changing the background to better support the figures and the narrative. She also will review other

artists' work and take inspiration from how they tackled different subjects. She shared a painting series that she had done of her daughter and her journey as she received stem cell therapy to treat her MS. These paintings drew on a wide variety of styles and iconographic images to represent her struggles and her successes.

In the series of paintings about her daughter, she studied the works of Klimt and Van Gogh and used the influences of these painters and their styles and made them her own. She was able, through her art, to express the emotions that both she and her daughter endured. Her journey as an artist through this tough time encourages other artists to use their own



experiences in conjunction with the design influences of master artists to create powerful work.

## Juror Workshop Review Layering with Depth with Jean Pederson

With her warmth, enthusiasm, dynamic energy and encouraging teaching style, Jean led us on a wild ride over the course of this fast-paced, mind-blowing workshop.

Day One: Jean emphasized the need to "know your materials." Supply tables were set up with a generous array of Holbein acrylic mediums, inks, paints and gesso for <u>us to use along with our own</u>

materials. We explored viscosity and transparency of the different mediums: working quickly, we added inks, fluid acrylic paint, and heavy-body acrylics, letting the colors flow together, covering the surface. While our papers dried, Jean demonstrated Gelli plate printing, which we practiced. Later we added our collage papers, more paint, alcohol, and marks from different tools to our prepared paper. She emphasized that this surface is not a finished painting, but a "ground" — the foundation for a painting.

Jean stressed "know your subject." After we decided on our subject, she told us to figure out value patterns. She demonstrated holding a piece of red Plexiglas over a painting, photo or scene to identify areas of light and dark. She suggested doing several small value studies of our subject or using the Notanizer app to find patterns we like.



Day Two: We did a rapid free-association exercise, quickly listing words important to us. Next to the words, we drew symbols and wrote

colors that we associate with them. Jean told us that by using these elements in our work, we add content that is personal and adds meaning for us and the viewer. She also said that when we transfer or sketch our subject, we should integrate it with the ground. She reminded us that the further we get away from realism, the less important realistic accuracy is to the viewer. We practiced making compositions by adding paint and collage to a magazine page used as a ground.

Day Three: We warmed up with fast-paced exercises using word prompts and music. Jean showed us examples of mixed media paintings illustrating design concepts she uses in her work: letting the underpainting show in places, "repetition with variety" in shapes, color, lines and markmaking, texture, and use of neutrals to "make color sing."

We spent the rest of the day painting to music.

Day Four: We learned how to make "acrylic skins" for collage, did another free-association exercise making sketches related to words we had chosen, painted new grounds, printed collage papers, and worked on our unfinished paintings. At the end of the day, Jean gave each of us a colored paper shape to use in a specific place on a white sheet of watercolor paper (mine was an irregular rectangle placed on the right side, on the edge).

Day Five: Jean emphasized non-referential work, showing us how abstract expressionist artists used elements of design to achieve balanced compositions in their paintings. She then directed us to make a painting with the shape she had given us. It was an exciting and fun exercise. At the end of the workshop, Jean told us to ask ourselves three questions:

- How will I interpret my subject?
- What media will I use?
- What style of expression resonates with me?

Jean is an excellent workshop instructor. She provided us with a wealth of information, encouraged us to add personal content to our work and to trust our instincts as artists. I look forward to applying what I learned from Jean in the future. Examples of paintings from this workshop are posted on the Watercolor Society of Oregon Facebook page.

## Fall 2025 Exhibition Prospectus

For full Prospectus details, refer to the WSO website:

### Fall 2025 Submission Requirements:

- 1. Exhibitions shall consist of no more than eighty (80) paintings, selected by a national juror chosen by the Board.
- 2. Only Lifetime and Active Members, current in their dues and residing in the State of Oregon, may submit to WSO juried exhibitions.
- 3. Each selected painting shall be by a different WSO Member.
- 4. Any painting which has been previously accepted and hung in a WSO exhibition is not admissible.
- 5. A maximum of two (2) images may be submitted.
- 6. Images must be in jpg format with the greatest dimension sized at 1200 pixels.
- 7. Images must be named as follows (example): SmithMary-GoneWithTheWind.jpg.
- 8. Work shall be completed within two (2) years of the submission deadline.
- 9. Work may be critiqued by a teacher and/or critique group and must have been executed without step-bystep instruction.
- 10. All work must be original in its concept, composition and design, and must be the creation of the artist. Original means "Created directly and personally by a particular artist; not a copy or imitation."
- 11. Artwork may not be altered once the image is submitted, except for the addition of the artist's signature.
- 12. All paintings accepted by the juror must be made available and delivered to the Convention Exhibition. Artists who do not make an accepted painting available for the exhibition will not be allowed to enter WSO exhibitions for two (2) years.

**Substrates:** Work must be on a single piece of untreated paper (plastic "paper," i.e., Yupo and Tyvek are not allowed); Embossing is not permitted.

**Media:** Open to water media that once dried can be reactivated by water; water media shall consist of paintings that are predominantly watercolor; acrylic, gesso, pastel, and collage are not acceptable; charcoal and ink are not acceptable, except for varieties that once dried can be reactivated with water.

**Varnish & Framing:** A frame and plexiglass are required. The frame must meet WSO specifications, pursuant to Policy X.E. Framing specifications are outlined in the acceptance document, a mat is optional; varnished work is not eligible. Metal or wood frames acceptable. Plexiglass only. No glass is accepted.

- RESIZE your image to 1200 pixels on the longest side. The WSO website now has a resizing tool. Access at https://watercolorsocietyoforegon.com, click *Exhibitions*. On the drop-down menu, select "How to Resize Images."
- 3. RENAME your image as follows (example) SmithMary-GoneWithTheWind.jpg
- 4. Note: No special characters can be used in the file name when submitting the images.
- 5. Submit entries on the WSO website: <u>https://watercolorsocietyoforegon.com</u>, click *Exhibitions*. On the drop-down menu, select "Submit Artwork."
