How to Prepare for a National Competition

 Lately, have you found yourself wondering: "Am I even ready to enter a national art show?" As big and scary as that question seems, you can answer that for yourself, just like you would start a painting. It all begins with a willingness to step out of your comfort zone, put on your "strategy hat" and embrace the unknowns.

• The following outline captures general steps and considerations; It's a basic structure for artists to make their own, a starting point to build a successful, organized approach to entering shows. Here are some general considerations from our panelists.

Panelist Questions:

- 1. How do I prepare my images?
- 2. If I get into a show, what about shipping costs and other costs?
- 3. Is it ok to enter a painting to a national show even though it's been in another show (WSO?) and/or won an award?

Set Your Goals:

- How many Shows do I want to enter?
- Consider setting a budget for entering shows.
- Narrow the focus: What kinds of shows do I want to enter?
- KEEP A JOURNAL There are online sources or use a sketch book.
 (Know your work and style i.e. mixed media? Pure watercolor?
 Paper or Panel?)
- Select which paintings will be entered. -Keep records of paintings entered into shows
- Select and photograph your artwork in preparation for submission.

Make a list of Shows and their key information:

- Entry Deadline & Acceptance Notification
- Juror Research their backgrounds, their artistic focus, and past jurying experience.
- Prospectus (READ, READ, READ)
- Understand the rules
- Look at last year's winners (if available online)
- Review painting sizes, requirements, framing, the rules matter!
- Show Dates & Location

Select Which Paintings to Enter:

- "An Artist is not paid for his labor, but for his vision" Whistler
- You can't be selected if you don't enter!
- Remind yourself that everything has already been done before just not by you.
- Use your critique group to discern which paintings are ready or find another artist whose opinion matters to you.
- You know when you know.
- Be confident in your entry
- PRESS SUBMIT!!

Use Rejection as a Strategic Tool

- How do you deal with rejection?
- Ask hard questions: Do my paintings stand out from the crowd? Is my composition strong? Is my style unique and not a copy of some other artist's style? Judging is subjective and judges will bring their own bias.
- Be crystal clear about your purpose, your vision, and your why behind your work. An artist will build confidence through entering more shows. So **NO** blaming, or negative self-reflection. Show that 'inner voice of self-doubt' the door! You can't be accepted unless you enter! (Didn't we just say that?)

- You will gain more insight and experience the more you enter shows.
- Remember, there is no secret sauce, only dedication of time in the studio, or as they say: Miles under the brush.
