#### **Jerry Whitsett**

Jerry Whitsett, 75, died unexpectedly March 19, 2011, while undergoing chemo/radiation treatment for esophageal cancer.

In 2004, Jerry juried into WSO. In 2007, he became a Lifetime Member. Jerry was married to Joan who is also a WSO Lifetime Member. They have two adult children and five grandchildren.

Jerry was a native of the Rogue Valley and after many years of school, service in the Navy, a career in Geology and Investments, and serving on the Mt. Ashland Ski Patrol, Jerry started painting in earnest.

Jerry was one of the owners of Art and Soul Gallery in Ashland. "The thrill of taking a piece of white paper, and by adding paint change it into an object of interest, is a reward that drives me to paint. I feel I can hear the sound of water or the rustle of leaves in a light breeze as the painting develops under my brush. I find inspiration and motivation by spending time in the woods, along streams, at the beach, in the mountains, winter and summer. The wonder of colors and shapes, the sounds and smells all have an effect on many of my paintings and each one has a little part of me."

Jerry's painting "Nakoa" was one of the 80 paintings in this spring's Aqueous Media Exhibition in Eugene.

#### **BOARD ACTION REPORT**

President Vinita Pappas called the WSO Board meeting to order on Saturday April 2, 2011.



#### Financial Business:

Treasurer Mila Raphael reported that WSO's total assets are \$103,185.05.

Total Income: \$24,852.77 from Jan. 1- Mar 22, 2011.

Total Expenses: \$6,764 Net Income: \$18,083.28

#### **Nomination Committee:**

Stepping down this year from Preregistration Chair is Cynthia Holloway. Victoria Tierney would also like to find a replacement for her position of Exhibition Tours sometime next year. Diana Nadal and Susan Greenbaum *(chair)* are both looking to retire from the Education Council.

#### **Administrative Council:**

In the first quarter of the year we have rented 34 videos. This represents a good number of rentals for the winter quarter, since it is usually slow. Gross revenue for the quarter was \$172. Expenses were \$34.87. All of the expenses were mailing expenses. The net income for the quarter for the rental program is \$137.13.

#### **Logo Merchandise:**

Sharon Rackham King had a funding request to purchase 72 mugs at a cost not to exceed \$300.

#### **Convention Pre-Registration:**

There were a larger-than-usual number of underpayments and overpayments this time. Mila and Cynthia discussed this and it's their assessment that allowing people to pay separately for the Critique Sessions as well as the Meet and Greet and Juror Demo left many members believing they didn't have to buy the Convention Package to go

to the Paint-outs. Others paid for the package but then added money unnecessarily for the critiques. They therefore recommend that we return to the format we had when the Convention Package started, with the Critiques part of the Package, not another item one can buy separately.

#### **EDUCATION COUNCIL**

The Education Council met for breakfast on Sunday morning, April 3<sup>rd</sup> at the Hilton Restaurant. The main topic

of discussion was the Educational Endowment Fund. We need to develop procedures for the reporting of financials, so expenses can be tracked more accurately.

We also need plans to replenish

and sustain the Fund, in addition to investment revenues. Several fundraising ideas were discussed; also, ways to get more of our membership to purchase framing materials from American Frame so our 5% quarterly rebate continues (See American Frame ad on next page). Workshops usually produce net revenues, so it may be worth offering additional workshops to help augment the Fund.

We will still continue budgeting \$2,000 per year for critique group workshops. We have modified the criteria to include non-WSO instructors. There's money left in this year's budget; the application and guidelines are on the WSO website for you to download.

#### **CRITIQUE GROUPS:**

Share the Wisdom, Expertise and Fun

There is a special chemistry and bonding that happens among artists who meet once a month to support each



other and share art. It is completely understandable that as a critique group grows, members create a selection process to include new members.

Everyone wants to encourage a "good fit," so that the critique group will continue to be a pleasant experience. Over the years, members of my critique group told me that there is an assumption that when a critique group invites a new person to their group, this invitation implies that this new person might be asked to become a member. Often a critique group will invite an individual to attend more than once. Sometimes the individual is not contacted unless the critique group asks them to become a member and this can stir up a feeling of uneasiness.

After some thought, I submitted this idea to our Splash Critique Group

at our last meeting:

Let's invite fellow artists to our critique group and say upfront that we are interested in having them attend as guests. Lee Baughman suggested that we make it clear that we are not interested in expanding our membership, and we would like them to just come for a visit. Ruth Armitage and other members agreed that we would like them to participate by asking them to critique our work as well as bring their artwork for critique.

My intention in sharing this with WSO Members at our Business Meeting on April 3<sup>rd</sup> was to encourage other critique groups to invite artists from outside their critique group for a visit. No concerns about membership, just share wisdom, expertise and fun. I believe we have a wealth of knowledge to share with each other and "crosspollinating," as Rene Eisenbart appropriately described what I am suggesting, would be a great way to share the wealth.

#### Artists' Insights Talk

The Jacobs Gallery is a wonderful place to have the spectacular WSO Exhibition. As one of the nicest and most sought after galleries in Eugene, it is a great opportunity for WSO. On Friday afternoon, several WSO artists with paintings in the Jacobs Gallery shared their insights. The talks were stirring and insightful regarding the creation process.

Lynda Hoffman-Snodgrass touched on her "Window of Dreams" by explaining its development. Kathy Tiger's "Nuda Veritas #3" was a journey into the world of tattoos, what tattoos mean to people getting them, why people get them, and also tattoos as an art form. Kathryn Damon-Dawson's painting "Arbitrage and Lace" was a passage into the spiritual realms, mixed with ancient elements and symbols of lace from her heritage. An emotional sharing by Vinita Pappas for "A Long Way from Home" was tearful and touching. Vinita painted her plein aire piece after receiving a letter from her son in Afghanistan. She was exploring his feelings of being in an unsafe place and the contrast of her being in Portland painting the bridge.

Lynn Powers' painting "Paul" was designed so that the concerned face of the man felt even heavier with the weight of the space above coming down upon him. In "Copalis Beach Buoys #3," Sally Schwader shared how she paints groups of things, because coming from a family of eight it seems natural to have clusters of things. Shirley Froyd explained that "Pinnacles" came out of experimentation. We heard a touching story from Juliana Jiang about "Journey Home #2 the Hidden Blueprint" about her looking for the blueprint for how to proceed in life. After a serious diagnosis of illness, she is grateful and delighted for being alive and well, experiencing a time for celebration.

A big thanks to WSO Convention Chairs and members for a wonderful experience in Eugene. Paul Bou





#### BASIC PHOTOSHOP ELEMENTS FOR ARTISTS WORKSHOP

It has been a pleasure to work with eager WSO Members who bring their laptops to our



Convention Workshops. Each session starts with a brief orientation, and this one ended with a finished acrylic painting that was inspired with the technology in Photoshop Elements. We have been making our way through the Tools on the Tools Bar and useful features on the Menu Bar.

In this session and last session we learned about the Zoom, Crop, Polygonal Lasso, Gradient, Smudge, Clone Stamp, and Brush Tools. We also explored how to use the Threshold feature under Filters to identify the dark and light design of a painting, as well as how to color enhance a photograph.

In our Fall Convention Workshop in Sunriver we will learn about the Layers Palette and how to combine and overlap images using variations of opacity. There are so many ways to improve our design and use of color in Photoshop Elements.

## GARVE BECKHAM RECEIVED WSO'S 2011 SERVICE AWARD

Every year at the WSO

Spring Banquet, the Service Award is presented to a deserving member for

their outstanding contribution to this organization. The recipient receives a commemorative plaque, a Lifetime Membership to WSO and our thanks and gratitude for their exemplary service to WSO.

This year at the Spring Convention in Eugene, on behalf of the Watercolor Society of Oregon, it was my great honor to present Garve Beckham with the WSO Service Award. Garve was one of my earliest instructors when he taught through Portland Community College. He was always patient and giving of every aspect of his talent. His humor and talent have earned him respect and admiration from his students and peers.

While studying architecture, Garve began his serious move toward art when he explored lower division painting and drawing at the University of Oregon. Beginning in 1970, he took his first class in watercolor from

Charles Mulvey, a world-renowned watercolorist. In the ensuing years, he has taken workshops from such prestigious American Watercolor Society artists as Joe Bohler, Rex Brandt, George Post, and Bud Shackelford.

Garve taught his first watercolor painting class for Portland Community College in 1972, where he taught continuously for 25 years.

Since 1997, he has taught for Clackamas Community College, Tillamook Bay Community College, Oregon Society of Artists, and most of the major art groups in the Portland, Oregon area, including the Portland Fine Arts Guild, the Buffalo Grass Society, and Lake Oswego Artists. He is an award-winning artist of the Watercolor Society of Oregon, as well as the Oregon Society of Artists. He has served as President of The Oregon Society of Artists, Vice President and President of the Watercolor Society of Oregon, and has served for many years as WSO's Historian. He is a charter member of the oldest and most prestigious critique group in Oregon.

For many years Garve traveled and taught many international watercolor workshops, in Thailand, the Caribbean, China, and at his beloved Cannon Beach here in Oregon. He especially loved to paint scenes of the northwest - in particular those pieces of history which are slowly fading out of sight - covered bridges, old barns, lighthouses, etc. But even more than his love for painting, he loved teaching and he loved his students.

With appreciation for years of dedication to the Watercolor Society of Oregon, the Members and Board thank you, Garve, for your service to WSO.

## BETSY DILLARD STROUD WORKSHOP

By Liz Walker

Twenty-six participants painted full-sheet paintings in a five-day workshop held at the Emerald Art Center in



Springfield, led by aqua-media artist Betsy Dillard Stroud. We learned to create our own carved stamps, use black and white gesso as a ground for transparent, translucent and opaque acrylics, and add collage papers to create layers of interest in our paintings.

Betsy's demo on Day 1 showed us how to start a geometric shaped abstract painting and create areas of interest using stamps that we carved from linocut blocks. We learned to mix luminous neutral greys - a great counterpoint to the bright colors in our paintings.

Day 2 was an exercise in drawing a simple subject matter (some chose flowers, rocks, still life objects) on our paper which we had covered in a light wet-into-wet acrylic underpainting and let dry. We then superimposed about 5 geometric shapes on top of the drawing, creating a great interlocking effect. Using 3 colors (primaries worked nicely), we mixed different strengths of each triad and changed colors every time we encountered a line in our drawing.

The third day was our chance to do a painting in the style of Matisse, working from black and white photocopies. We were encouraged to use our own reference photo as long as we incorporated some aspect of a Matisse painting into it. We had fun drawing our subject matter in black gesso, and then filling in the spaces with beautiful color mixtures. Betsy demonstrated several techniques for adding texture and pattern.

Betsy showed us on Day 4 how she creates a "big black shape" painting, and we all followed suit. She discovered this technique several years ago when she was holding a bottle of black gesso during a demo and it

splattered all over the paper! After we painted a random big black shape that covered two-thirds of our paper and let it dry, we added a bright color to the remaining parts of the paper, and then began mixed grey neutrals using the bright color and a touch of its opposite (plus white to create opacity).

Participants were amazed at how much they were stretched as artists during the 5-day workshop. Many of us worked in ways that were unfamiliar to us - using acrylics, working abstractly, and painting on full sheets in a limited workspace but our diligence and enthusiasm paid off. By the end of the week, we had all created full sheet "starts" that we can further develop once we get back to our own studios.

Betsy provided her wisdom and helpful suggestions during critiques, as well as colorful stories about her experiences as an artist. A question and answer session on the last day brought everyone together one last time for a lively discussion of framing/matting options, favorite brands of acrylic paints, and above all the importance of finding your own painting style.


Painting helps to keep me centered. When I am painting, time does


#### BOOK REVIEW By Carrie Holst

#### Collage Techniques, A Guide for Artists and Illustrators

*By Gerald Brommer*Watsun Guptil, 1994

I wish I had bought this book a long time ago. I was very impressed with the variety of media included.

Part one is about Brommer's well recognized rice paper collage technique. He goes in depth about his collection and organization of papers, how he will build collages over old watercolor paintings and then apply paint again over those papers. The final result can be an added textural effect with big changes in composition. More collage techniques by other artists follow, using a variety of media and methods. (See our society




handbook for specific rules on collage accepted in WSO shows.)

In Part II, Brommer moves the focus to Artist Expression using the elements of design for emphasis and direction. This is the content for which you buy books like this, and it will satisfy the needs of any level of painter. In this case it's more about the artist's message; what you want to say with your art.

I also felt encouraged to play,

explore and experiment. There don't have to be any time limits; you can complete a piece in a few hours or develop your work over a period of years. The possibilities are endless.



#### Watercolor, Depth and Realism By Laurie Humble North Light Books, 2008

I checked this book out from the Multnomah County Library. I knew nothing about the book but I recognized the artist's name from Paul Kasmir's blog. He had taken her workshop and had very positive results. Also, as I thumbed through the pages, I recognized an image that was on the cover of Watercolor Magazine. I scanned the table of contents next and saw a list of headers that ended with 'put it all together!'

I really like her paintings. They are realistic but not rigid. I feel Laurie paints shapes by looking very carefully and painting what she sees. She sees rich color and knows how to make it work. She discusses the concept of the unifying wash (along with the push/pull). There are a number of exercises in the book that will aid the reader/ artist to achieve depth and realism in their work.

I suppose some of the exercises in this book are a bit beyond a new painter, but that should not let them shy away from trying out new lessons or ideas. Sooner or later, with a few miles on her brushes, the less experienced will be the more experienced.
