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IN MEMORIAM



Sally Bailey (Astoria)

The art community lost one of its most beloved members on August 23. Sally Bailey died from lung cancer at age 68. She looked the epitome of good health. She swam regularly, hiked and walked all over Astoria, and ate nothing but organic, healthy food. She neither smoked nor drank alcohol. When she was diagnosed with cancer in January, we were stunned.

In typical fashion, she attacked her illness with vigor and organization. She immediately made arrangements for her eventual demise, and got all of her legal affairs in order. When someone marveled at her businesslike approach, she simply replied, *"I'm just doing what everyone should be doing all along."*

She never stopped painting during this time. We could always count on her to be the first on site during our plein air expeditions. She was easily recognizable in her signature outfit: sturdy walking shoes, khaki shorts, jacket and baseball cap. The outfit never varied.

She once said she thought her role in life was to tell others how to get things done. And she did, occasionally ruffling a few feathers. But those of us who knew her best just let her take charge; she was good at it.

Towards the end, when we all tried so hard to help her, it felt like she was thinking up things for us to do, just to keep us busy. If we tended to get a little overly sentimental, she'd say, *"There's no point in getting all weepy."* Well, she's gone now, and we'll weep if we want to. We'll never paint outdoors without remembering how she loved it, how she noticed every shadow, glint of sunshine, every cloud in the sky.

And when we're stumbling around in disarray, we'll wonder what she would have done. Sally Bailey was a fine artist, and an excellent friend. We'll miss her forever.

Peggy Clark died on Sept. 27, 2011 at the age of 64. Born April 08, 1947, Peggy lived life to the fullest. She was a wife, mother, grandmother, sister, friend and animal lover. Two of her passions in life were her watercolor paintings and cooking, each of which friends and family were able to happily share. Peggy faced her cancer with a strength and courage that was admired by all who knew her.

Peggy was a watercolorist and caricature artist. She and her husband lived in Portland where she did court sketches for local TV stations and many other companies. She also taught watercolor painting at Village Gallery and Oregon Society of Artists. She was an acclaimed artist, and displayed her paintings in many galleries including the Art Museum Rental Sales Gallery.

Peggy and her friend Terry Street traveled together and went to many workshops. Terry wrote that one of Peggy's favorite instructors was Eric Weigardt, and she shared his love of painting boats. Most recently Peggy was painting downtown Portland scenes.

Peggy took a workshop at Menucha with Harold Walkup and Susan Spears last year. Harold had this to say: "Peggy's paintings were classic watercolors with landscapes, seascapes and figures dominating her work. Although her paintings were 'classic' she always had a way of painting her subject that put the viewer right in the painting.

I didn't know for a long time that Peggy was an instructor at OSA, but I could see from her work that she was an insightful and talented painter. When it came time to critique in my class, she always had a painting to discuss, and she took to heart the small suggestions or comments the class made. Her next paintings were always better for it because she applied quickly what she learned.

It's never easy to say goodbye to talent and personality and that certain gift of determination that so defined Peggy. Her paintings will be a wonderful reminder to her family and friends and she will be fondly remembered in our hearts."

CHANGES TO ONLINE ENTRY FOR SPRING 2012



By Ruth Armitage Few members may be aware, but the WSO website incurred a malicious hacking in late

September. Many sites hosted by *In Motion Hosting* were affected. No personal data appears to be compromised and the site was restored from backups in a timely manner, thanks to Rob's expertise.

However, the Board felt it necessary to tighten security for the online entry process to protect the images and privacy of our members. As you read the current prospectus, you will notice a slight change in entry procedure.

In order to submit images, artists will need to enter the username: wsoentry. This username will be the same for all members and all shows. Artists will then enter a password: spring2012. This password will rotate for each show. Each prospectus will contain the pertinent instructions.

Hopefully this simple change will not prove to be cumbersome, but will ensure a more secure website.

I would like to encourage you all to plan on entering the Spring Exhibition. Remember, your painting can't get juried into a WSO Exhibition if you don't enter.

Here is WSO's time-line for entering exhibitions:

• Spring Prospectus comes out in the November Watermark.

• Entry opens November 15, closing February 1 at 8 pm.

• Spring Convention and Exhibition are generally the first full weekend in April. (*this date is sometimes adjusted for the Easter Holiday*)

• Fall Prospectus comes out in the May Watermark.

• Entry opens May 15, closing on August 1 at 8 pm.

• Fall Convention and Exhibition are held the first full weekend in October.

Please be sure to review the Entry Prospectus for each exhibition. Changes may occur that you were unaware of. If for some reason you lose your Prospectus that came with your *Watermark*, there is always one posted at WSO's Website.

If you have questions or need help with entering a WSO Exhibition, you will find a list of volunteers on the Prospectus to help you. It is time now to get to work painting, as WSO will be looking forward to your entries this spring!

To the delight of everyone, the 80 paintings hung in the Betty Grey Gallery in the Sunriver Lodge were in full view all weekend long. Since the exhibit is on two floors in a public hall, we could stroll by and look at the paintings throughout the entire weekend. And what a remarkable show of talent!

Saturday was packed with a variety of exciting choices for

Convention attendees. Those willing to brave the early morning chill of freezing fog (which happily burned off to reveal a sun-drenched fall day) were richly rewarded. Traditional Paint-outs were popular as Chris Keylock-Williams invited members to paint from her gorgeous deck on the Deschutes River. Susan Spears took a group to the Crosswater Pool Deck, where they could see both the Deschutes River and Mt. Bachelor.

Ed Labadie's "Designing Dynamic Paintings"

WSO Member Ed Labadie led 15 artists in a simple, fun exercise that demystified the design of a painting. We were asked to bring an old brush for acrylics, a glue stick and scissors, an open mind and enthusiastic attitude. Ed walked us through a review of the fundamentals of design and composition, and showed us how to apply these lessons to any style of art, from traditional to contemporary abstract.

We cut shapes out of paper painted with black and gray acrylic paint. Then we placed the shapes on white paper to create various compositions. Once we decided on the best arrangement, we glued the shapes down. Ed asked us to always remember the word '*shapes*' when designing our compositions.

Many thanks Ed, for a great workshop, and for giving us ideas that we can later incorporate into our own work.

Cindy Briggs, Winnie Givot and Denise Rich had a very well organized class geared to please each landscape painter, whether we painted sunsets, deep spatial landscapes, or focused on the textures of one beautiful tree. It was a full three hours of energy from very different

perspectives.

I felt stretched artistically and enriched by their very different, personal approaches to painting. Each artist teacher broke down her subject into simplified steps. Amazingly they kept to the schedule, changing teachers right on cue. Also the helpers *(fetching water for us and tending to any need we had)* were key in keeping the confusion to a minimum and making this session a memorable one.

Members attending Blenda Tyvoll's presentation on the art website, *Etsy.com*, learned that artists can also be successful marketers and have fun doing it! Blenda used a projector to display the Etsy website, along with her personal shop page and the Etsy analysis tools regarding her sales. Explaining the supportive community side of the site, she showed examples of how Etsy members can network to help each other become more visible and successful. Ruth Armitage also participated, showing her Etsy page and discussing her experience with the site.

An especially helpful part of Blenda's presentation was the stepby-step, start-to-finish creation of an Etsy shop for Kara Pilcher. Then Blenda generously answered all questions from attendees, showed examples of her work and packaging, and revealed her sources for materials. With enthusiasm and encouragement, Blenda helped demystify the steps to selling on Etsy. However, her success is ultimately the result of the time and effort she spends maintaining her shop and relationships on Etsy.

Judy Hoiness and Harold Walkup: "How We Got Here"

Judy and Harold took turns in this stimulating session talking about their creative process. We all came to realize that, as Harold said, *"There is not one 'aha moment' in an artist's work,"* but rather incremental phases combined with hard work that help artists achieve their goals.

Judy spoke about how she came to incorporate her passions into her art. These passions include drawing/ painting landscapes, environmental issues, and calligraphy. She shared with us her favorite art books, and showed us unusual tools she uses (some of which she made out of old soda cans!)

I marveled at her habit of cutting out evocative pictures and words from magazines and putting them into a box. Later she pulls ideas out of the box when she sits down to paint. She asks the important questions that all artists should ask of themselves: "What are my passions and interests?" and "What did I enjoy as a child?" Judy encouraged us to consider incorporating the answers to these questions into our artwork.

Judy was a tough act to follow, but Harold quietly enthralled the crowd with the many paintings he's done over the years. He showed us his very first watercolor, from 1972! He described his early struggles with watercolor, and his frequent workshops with Zoltan Szabo. As Harold shared his early paintings with us he commented on techniques and

principles he didn't know then, but has since mastered.

Harold paints 200 paintings a year. He works on more than one series at a time, because many different subjects reflect his personal ideas and goals. After the session was over, I told Harold (*who is my former teacher/mentor*) that this session reminded me of just how much I have learned from him over the years.

We are truly lucky in WSO to have artists like this in our midst, who come and share their journey with others.

in Sunriver following the WSO Fall Convention.

Ted began each day with a lecture that included slides illustrating his philosophy on light, color, composition and life in general. He shared his creative journey and the life changing events that brought him to this moment in his career.

One thing he emphasized every day of the Workshop was that even as accomplished as he is, he still experiences the fear that we all feel when beginning a painting. Like all of us, he has had to learn how to push through negative feelings and get on to the act of painting.

After these wonderful lectures, Ted treated us to a painting demonstration where we witnessed his glazing technique punctuated with what he calls "sloppy dots" and textured backgrounds. He has a knack for creating glowing skin tones in the portraits he paints from photographs.

Our afternoons were spent incorporating our new knowledge into our own paintings. It is amazing how difficult it is to achieve the same effect, but we all tried, and were rewarded with personal attention and helpful feedback, as we created some successful portraits of our own.

The workshop was held in Fort Funnigan, the "kid's club" in Sunriver, and our lectures and slide shows took place a few steps away in The Outpost. According to Ted, this was the first time he has taught in a yurt. On Wednesday, we were all treated to a *Star Wars* music broadcast from the sky, and a sample of what an evacuation warning might sound like in the high desert. Pretty Spooky!

Wednesday evening we shared a potluck dinner at the home where a

few students were staying, as the full moon rose over the heart of Oregon. All in all, it was a wonderful week filled with information and techniques we can apply to our own work. Many people said that it was the best workshop they had ever been to!

The WSO Merit Award challenge has added some new levels. It's time we recognized perennial

achievers who have garnered 75 or 100 points. We've run out of "precious jewel" names like Gold and Diamond levels. So, we decided to leave earth's boundaries.

Our new name for an artist with 75 points is the Comet Award (beyond Earth's boundaries and still rising). The new name for an artist who reaches 100 points is the Celestial Award (truly in outer space with this many points).

You qualify to enter the program when you have accumulated ten points. Send a list of your points to me for verification and I'll keep track of them after that.

In the past and through the Fall 2008 Convention in Florence you got a total of five points for a Sweepstakes award, three points for 1st, 2nd or 3rd, and 1 point for paintings that got in the show but did not win an award.

Beginning Spring '09, we changed the name of Sweepstakes to "*Best of Show*" and it still earns 5 points. We have dropped the name of 1st Place. Now we have 2nd through 6th Place awards, followed by awards of Achievement and Distinction. You earn a total of four points for a 2nd, 3rd or 4th Place award, a total of three points for all other award winning paintings and one point for paintings that got into a show but did not win an award.

You will receive recognition at conventions as you reach each level, and a beautiful WSO logo pin at 25 points (*platinum level, a silver pin*) and at 50 points (*diamond level, a gold pin.*) Congratulations to our Merit Award recipients at the Fall 2011 Convention.

for the Western Federation of Watercolor Societies. Additionally she is a Signature Member of both the National and the Northwest Watercolor Societies. Ruth Armitage is one busy lady!

Still Going Strong at 90: VIRGINIA IMBLER

Although she will turn 91 in early December, Eugene WSO Member Virginia Imbler is still painting away.



Her mother was an oil painter and encouraged her to draw from an early age. After art classes in high school in Twin Falls, Idaho she went on to what was then Pepperdine College in Los Angeles. She crammed in all the art courses the school offered. However, the aunt she lived with insisted she major in Home Economics because "after all you are only going to be a wife and mother." That she did become. But even as a young mother she managed to sell some poster paint images to the city of Los Angeles. They paid her \$15 a painting... then screen printed them for distribution all over L.A. County.

By the time her three children entered high school she started back to school herself at Cal State in Northridge in the early 60's. She poured herself into nearly every aspect of art including sculpture...everything but watercolor. She took a shine to life drawing and went on to oils, specializing in portraiture. In 1970 Virginia moved to Marina Del Ray and joined the Beverly Hills Art League, which sponsored many successful shows. Her most inspiring teacher during this period was Corinne West Hartley, who liked to paint in watercolor but was switching to oils because of the better market.



The next move found her in Escondido, CA where, among others, she joined the Escondido Art Association. Here, she laughingly recalls, they made her stop entering their shows because

she was winning too many prizes.

Next she joined a group associated with the San Diego Watercolor Society. They hired a model. In the ensuing months of painting from life she taught herself the techniques of watercolor. After joining the San Diego Watercolor Society she went on to exhibit in many of their competitions.

The only drawback in these years was that her husband wanted her to be his golf partner. But when they moved to Eugene in 1989 she boycotted him... daylight was for painting time.

After Fred and Libby Masarie discovered her paintings at the Lane County Fair she was talked into joining WSO. In the ensuing years she has entered and been accepted into several shows. She has since lost interest in entering WSO because her time has been filled with painting commissions, always referred to her by word of mouth. Sometimes they are portraits, but most often they show the figure in the landscape or in activities. Her home is filled with paintings of her family. Currently she is planning a painting of her youngest two-year-old great grandson. He will be pictured perched in her Japanese maple tree, and appear on her next Christmas card. Just last week a neighbor commissioned her to do a portrait of her two children, so Virginia will have plenty to keep her going at 91.

chunky shapes and charges in colorful, animated pigments. This DVD is chalk full of design and ideas to make your paintings dance. I recommend watching it a couple of times, then head for your paper and paints while your creative juices are revved! There is no production date on the DVD, but indications make me believe

it was made sometime between 2007-2009 and created in North Carolina.

You will see Mr. Webb painting quickly, with the largest brush he can get away with. You won't see much detail till the end because he is painting large flat shapes that interlock and

have interesting boundaries. In some areas a damp wash may be 'charged' with another color to mingle on the paper. Enjoyable color proves to be harmonious color.

I would recommend this video to the beginning and advanced painter because it shows how much fun watercolor is.
